

## STEDMAN HAD BIG MAJORITY

Official Returns Give Congressman Lead of 3362

### SOME RADICAL CHANGES

Blair Carried Only Forsyth, Stokes and Surry Counties, With Big Democratic Gains in Alamance, Durham, Guilford and Rockingham Counties.

The democracy of the fifth congressional district is to be congratulated upon the magnificent victory which has just been won. From time to time the unofficial majorities in the several counties have been printed. It was impossible to get the correct vote in all of the counties until the meeting of the board of canvassers. The official vote in the counties of the district show a majority of 3362. The majorities in the several counties are as follows:

By reference to the vote of this district in 1908 it will be seen that there was some very radical changes, especially in the counties of Alamance, Durham, Guilford, Rockingham and Surry. In 1908 we lost Alamance county by 37 votes. This year we regained it by a majority of 312. In 1908 we carried Durham by 20 votes. This year we carry it by 692 votes. In change of 672 votes in our favor. We lost Orange this time by 230, making a change of 294 votes. We lost Person in 1908 by 180 votes. We regained Person in this election with a majority of 66 votes, making a change of 249 votes in our favor. We lost Stokes at the last election by 681 votes. At this election we make a gain of 285 votes in Stokes county. In 1908 we lost Surry county by 1091. At this election Blair carried the county by 536 votes only, making a net gain in our favor of 465 votes. It will be seen that we gained in Stokes and Surry 733 votes at this election over 1908. The largest gains were made in Rockingham county, which we lost in 1908 by 213 votes. We carried the county at this election by 649, making a change in our favor of 862 votes in Rockingham county.

### Presents Portrait of Gen. Davie to State

Raleigh, Nov. 16.—Hon. James O. Carr delivered the address yesterday afternoon in the state senate chamber here for the presentation of an oil portrait of General William B. Davie to the state. It is the gift of the North Carolina Society Sons of the Revolution, of which Mr. Carr is an honored member. Mr. Carr reviewed comprehensively the career of General Davie who enjoyed the reputation as a general of the revolutionary army of having killed more of the enemy in single combat than any other man. He was sent by the American government to France as special envoy to the court of Napoleon. He was also a governor of North Carolina, and by his devotion to the cause of the University of North Carolina won the title of "Father of the University." The oil painting is a splendid likeness and is the work of Mr. Jacques Busbet, well known Raleigh artist. The acceptance of the portrait on the part of the state was by Attorney General T. W. Bickett.

### SCORES ARE FREEZING

#### HEAVY RAINS HAVE CONVERTED MINING REGION IN DEATH TRAP.

Montreal, Can., Nov. 16.—Scores if not hundreds of prospectors are freezing and starving to death in the new Porcupine gold region in northwest Ontario, according to the report of W. R. McLean, an American expert, who succeeded in reaching here alive today. Heavy rains have converted the region into huge swamps, obliterating trails and making it impossible for the men to escape. McLean brought news of a score of deaths of which he knew personally while every survivor he met told of others.

### Nearly News From Virginia.

The heirs of S. M. Sprouse have brought suit in the circuit court at Staunton against the city for \$10,000 damages for the loss of Mr. Sprouse's life. Sprouse was knocked into an opening on Lewis street, while at work arching the cavern, and was drowned.

### The Luck Construction Company, of Roanoke, was yesterday awarded the contract for the building of the railroad from Ridgway, Va., to Spray, N. C. Under the terms of the contract the road is to be completed by April. The new road is to be built by New York financiers and the Marshall Field company, of Chicago, the latter concern owning seven cotton mills at the latter place.

### The home of John Groon, colored, in Stafford county was burned Sunday night, and his 5-year-old child, who was the only occupant of the house at the time of the fire, was burned to death. The origin of the fire is unknown.

### Hugh Cross, while hunting in Hanover county, shot a buck deer. He stopped the animal, but did not kill it. Seeing the buck about to rise, Cross leaped upon its back and rode him about a quarter of a mile before the buck gave up.
