NANKING TO FALL TO REBELS TODAY

Expected They Will Possess City
by Tonight

FIREFIGHTING AT GATES

Rebels Lost 200. While Imperialists
Casualties Reach 2,000—Big Battle
Commenced Sunday and Continued
This Morning—Foreigners
Killed in Manchou Territory.

Nanking, Nov. 27.—The rebels
will be in possession of Nanking to-
night. The city gates were stormed
by a fierce bombardment this morn-
ing, covering an attack all along the
walls. The rebels' loss was 200 and
the imperialists 2,000.

From the Tiger Hill fort for several
hours Sunday morning big guns
spoke repeatedly, while further up,
along the northeastern range from the
top of Purple Mountain, overlooking
the Ming Tombs for a 15-mile semi-
circle westward to the Yangtze, smaller
shots scattered into every section of the
city. So far as is known the casualty list
is not large. General Wong, second
in command of defenders, is another
name killed.

During the earlier part of the day,
the imperialists attempted a sortie
against the attacking forces, with a
view to reoccupying their positions
and guns but were driven back in-
side the walls with considerable
losses. The Tiger Hill batteries,
meanwhile, were pounding shells in-
to Lion Hill. They succeeded in silencing
the batteries there which, it is
suspected, were of little value.

The victory of Nanking and the
Tartar general, in fear of General
Chang, the imperialist commander,
have taken refuge in the Japanese
consulate, in which only the consul
remains. He is the sole official rep-
resentative of foreign interests now
in Nanking. The consulate is well
guarded by marines.

It is reported that desperate fight-
ing has taken place between the
revolutionists and bandits in Hwai-
yuan, Anhwei province, and that a
thousand bandits were killed.

Murder of Foreigners in Shen-Si

Shanghai, Nov. 27.—Reports of
murders of foreigners in the provin-
ces of Shen-Si and Shan-Si have
been received here with the gravest
apprehension. It is quite evident
that a strong element of boisterous
fanaticism within the empire of Peking
remains within the grasp of the
government might be expected to
be in control. Throughout the
south, which is held by the revolution-
aries, not a single case even of
injury to foreign interests, except
what may be attributed to accident,
has occurred.

The throne seems helpless to pre-
vent murders by the boxers, who are
in no way connected with the revolu-
tionaries, while on the other hand,
the revolutionaries are defending the
vast trading districts in south
and central China. The commercial
houses of all nationalities are losing
heavily.

More Jap Troops.
Tokio, Nov. 27.—A statement is-
sued by the foreign office says the
Japanese troops at Peking and Tien
Tsin will be reinforced immediately.

Prof. Wilson Goes to Atlanta.
Prof. L. Purlock Wilson, who for
the past three years has been super-
intendent of the Monroe schools, left
Sunday for Atlanta to accept the po-
sition of the head of the English de-
partment of the boy's high school in
that city, to which he was recently
elected. Prof. Wilson is a son of Mr.
A. W. Wilson of this city.

TO MEET NEXT AT BURLINGTON

Fourth Day's Work of the M. P.
Conference at Henderson

Henderson, Nov. 27.—The fourth
day of the Methodist Protestant Con-
ference at Henderson, was be-
ginning with devotional services con-
ducted by Rev. Ledbetter of Elton College.
A special prayer led by Rev. W. C.
Kennett was offered especially re-
membering the sick, who perhaps
would otherwise have been in the con-
ference. Rev. Kennett is one of the
oldest members of the conference. He
is no longer in the active work, but
is loyal to his church and is a faith-
ful soldier of the Cross.

After the minutes were read and
approved, the order of the day ar-
rived to fix a place for the meeting
of the next annual conference. In-
vitations were extended from Burling-
ton, Shelby and Raleigh churches.
Speeches were made in favor of each
of these places, showing the respec-
tive advantages. By vote Burlington
was selected.

The conference then resolved it-
self into the Electoral College. The
teller's report showed that the bal-
lot taken on Friday resulted in the
election of Rev. T. M. Johnson, Rev.
C. A. Cecil and Rev. W. E. Swain,
D. D., as delegates to the general con-
ference. No layman had received the
sufficient number of votes to elect.
There yet remains eight preachers
and eleven laymen to be elected.

Durham People at Mr. Jourdan's Funeral

went over to Cary Sunday morning
to attend the funeral services of the
late J. B. Jourdan who died Friday
afternoon. The funeral services were
conducted from the Methodist church
at Cary by the pastor, Rev. Mr. Pleh-

the state having assembled to pay
a last tribute to the deceased revenue
officer.

The father died with pellagra several
months ago, and the mother is now
seriously ill with the same fatal
disease. The funeral services were
held from the residence on Worth
street this afternoon.

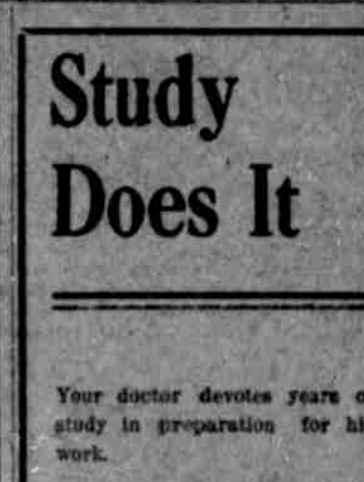
