

Yes, sir; this is Holland, the specie magazine of Europe and America; the meadow and the garden of Europe; the happy home of a rich, moral, and tranquil population of 200 to the square mile, and which has made itself what it is, not by building paper credit banks, and borrowing money on the resources of posterity, but by INDUSTRY, ECONO-MY, HARD MONEY, and SHORT CREDIT.


