The apprentice system continues in operation; and thus far, its results are highly satisfactory. The conduct of the young lads is generally exemplary, and such is their rapid rogress in the art of seamanship, that by the time they are of age for sea service, our commanders generally prefer them to older sen-men. I take this occasion to recommend that this system be fostered to the utmost extent of which it is susceptible, being fully of the opinion that it presents one great means of partially, at least, remedying that increasing scarcity of competent petty officers and able seamen, which greatly embarrasses the operations of the navy, delays the sailing of our public vessels, and places the defence of the honor and interests of the United States

of which are foreigners.
