

Inclined Water Wheel.

It is now constructed and in suc-

cessful operation at the Coal Creek Mills in this

Town. The invention was designed to save water

in its operation, and thereby reduce the

water required to drive the wheel, and it ap-

plies in place of the flat wheel, the saving most

being still greater. The height of Mills (now in op-

eration by these wheels) the height of water in the

tunnels, is supposed to average 80 or 90

feet. It is believed water can be easily oper-

ated with even less water than required, it is ob-

served that the supply of water will be abundant.
