IGOING TO MUSTER IN NORTH CAROLINA.

ST THE AUTHOR OF "COUSIN SALLY DILLIARD." John S. Guthrie, Esq., of Chatham county, Ge., long a member of the Legislature, was distinguished for his good sense, fine wit, and occasionally some of the most extraordinary bursts of elequence. Our various passages (his and mine) have been too frequent and on notorious for me to get into print, and not he also.
