OLD MECKLENBURG RIGHT SIDE | NEW YORK SPRING TRADE THE WAR. UP-THE SPIRIT of 75 YET ALIVE! LATER FROM THE ARMY.

The U. S. steamship Eudora arrived at New Orleaus on the 19th, from Brazos Santingo, whence she sailed on the 12th ult. She brought over a number of officers, and Mr O. Hammond, bearer of despatches from Gen. Scott to the Government.

The steamer Giraffe was lost on the 7th inst, in a heavy norther, fifty miles south of the mouth of the Rio Grande. The vessel was totally lost, and with it four men, names pot knowu

There was no news (says the Com. Times) at the Brazos, from the Army. Gen. Scott was there on the 12th inst., and would remain a few days, when it was expected he would leave for Tampico or Victoria. He has sent an express to Genereal Taylor, informing the latter that he would meet him at Tampico or Victoria. It was not previously known which of these two places was indicated, as the express had not returned when the Eudora sailed. TEXAN PRISONERS. - Mr Gillespie, 1e-

leased lately by Santa Anna at San Luis, (says the Matamoros Flag) has just returned to Matamoros. Mr Gillespie was captured was at China, on the 16th of September last, and was taken on to San Luis, in advance of the retreating Mexicaus from Monterey. Upon his arrival in San Luis, he, with other pisoners, was put in prison, and remained in confinement until released in compliment to General Taylor, by order of Sauta Auna. He speaks in terms of the highest praise of nearly all the Mexican officers, save one, with whom he had any dealings; and one officer in particular; Capt. Gouzdas, of the 9th Cavalry, he thinks the prisoners can never forget for the kindness and consideration with which he treated them. The officer from whom the prisoners had received harsh treatment was, upon their representation, broken of his command and placed under arrest-

The number of troops at San Luis, M Gillespie states to be 27,000 at the time of his departure, with an additional force of 10,-000 somewhere in the vicinity. This large force was under constant drill, and many foreign officers were said to be engaged in the service. Great euthusiasm and the most perfect subordination prevailed in the Mexican lines.

A report had been brought to Mier, by a Mexican, as we learn from the Matamoros Flag, in a correspondence from Camargo to that paper, dated the 3d inst., that Gen. Quitman, with 2000 volunteers, had given battle the precoding day to 12000 Mexicans under Gen. Urrea, two leagues north of Victoria.

Last Thursday was a proud day for the sons of old Meckleuburg. Ou that day, Capt. Caldwell, of our volunteers, addressed his company relative to the action of the Legislature in voting ten thousand dollars to the Regiment, and the appointment of Field Officers by Gov. Graham. He said he did not

address them as whigs or democrats, but as independent freemen of Meckleuburg, who had volunteered in a glorious and patriotic cause. Although among the officers of the company, there were to be found the bloodrelations of Gov. G., he felt well assured that

all would freely join in an expression of indignation at the treatment our volunteers has received at the bands of the Legislature and Governor. He concluded by offering the following Resolutions, which by aclammation, were adopted unanimously. So, that if Cols. Paine and Fagg want men to command, they will have to get them elsewhere than in Mecklenburg. Such men can never command the sons of Mecklenburg on the field of battle. But here are the Resolutions :

Resolved, That we view the action of the Legislature, in the passage of the law granting \$10,000 to the North Carolina Regiment of Volunteers, as a gross insult to the Volunteers-requiring them, as it does, to endorse a lie upon their own government, and a stigma of disgrace upon the cause in which they are about to peril their lives, should they receive the money.

Resolved, That we disdain to receive a cent of said appropriation on any such terms; but hurl it back, to be divided pro rata among the miscrable partisans who helped to pass the law, to be divided according to grade, to be regulated by the agency each man had in passing the law.

Resolved, That we regard ourselves as freemen, capable of appreciating the service which we have Volunteered, and also, of appreciating the qualifications of suitable Field Officers, and that rather than march under commanders thrust upon us against our will, we now instruct our Captain to tender our Company to the President in the Regular service, as a Company of Dragoous, for and during the war .- Meck. Jeff.

NEW ORLEANS, JAB. 25. FROM MEXICO.

By the arrival of the brig Jefferson, Capt. Morgan, from Havana, which port she left on the lltu inst., accounts from Mexico, received at Havana by the British mail steamer Dec have come to haud. The dates from Vera Cruz are to the 31st Dec.

The proposition of our government to enter into segetiations for peace, the Commercial Timer, which has received letters, says, has been rejected by Congress, but 19 members voting to entertain it.

It would appear from the correspondence of the Times, that the blockade of the coast is very imperfect. The blockade of Vera Ciuz has been effected, but Avarado, only a short distance south of that place, has been left an open port, and one of the letters says a vessol, and sometimes two or three, arrive there from Havana.

The minister of Foreign Relations, in communicating the proposition for peace to Congress, says the Executive branch of the government is unwilling to enter into negotiation under the existing circumstances.

The report of the minister of Finance represents the treasury to be much embarrassed. The expenses of the army at San Luis Potosi bordered on \$400,000 a mouth, and of that of Vera Cruz on \$80,000, and it was found impossible to supply this sum entirely.


