



A dispatch, dated Baltimore, April 27th, announced the arrival of the Br Steam Ship Cambria at Halifax the preceding day, with Liverpool accounts to the 14th inst. The Cambria brings out \$50,-000 in specie. The following is a synopsis of the intelligence she furnishes: THE MARKETS.

COTTON .- The Cotton market was dull during the week preceding the sailing of the Cambria, and there was a further decline of one-eighth to a quarter of a penny. The week's transactions amounted to only 25,00 bales, of which 500 were taken by speculators, and 4,300 for exportation. The closing quotations were as follows: Upland, ordinary, 3f to 3f. fair 43.

BREAD-STUFFS .- In consequence of the resumption of hostilities between Germany and Denmark, whereby the supplies of grain from the Baltic have been almost suspended, the market for Bread-Stuffs in Liverpool for the last week, Court of Pleas and Quarter Sessions-March animation. The latest quotations for the best Ohio Flour have advanced to 24 a 25s. per barrel.

NAVAL STORES .- Five tons of American Turpentine sold at 31s. 6d. per cwt. One hundred barrels Rosin, were disposed of at the reduced price of 3s. to 3s 6d. per cwt.

GENERAL INTELLIGENCE.

ENGLAND .- The general commotion which is in course of progress throughout Europe, has no visible effect in England. She remains quiescent, but with less glowing prospects of a revival of trade.

fRELAND.—The trial of Duffy was progressing at Dublin, but the result could not be ascertained in time to send off by the steamer.
