THE LAW OF NEWSPAPERS.

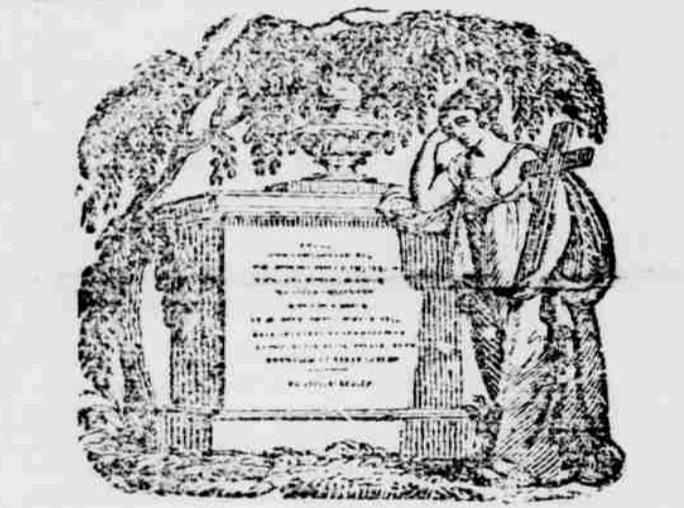
1. All subscribers who do not give express notice to the contrary, are considered as wishing to continue their subscriptions.
