THE GREEN SUN OF 1531. . In the memory of many yet living. there occurred in 1831, a phenomenon which will never be forgotten by them, and which will be handed down by tradition to their remotest generations. Parallel circumstances gave the phenomenon

In the year 1831, in the month of August, during the dog days, appeared what was called the green sun. For many days previous, a heavy and mysterious silence had chained the elements, no clouds had obscured the sky, and no forked lightnings had cleaved the firmament. The deep mutterings of the thunder were unheard, yet a pall hung over the face of nature. A strange and solemn calm rested upon every thing, and men looked wondering at

Those who have read Latrobe's voyage down the Ohio, in 1811, at the time when the great earthquake of that year devastated the west, if they saw this phenomenon, can enter futo his feelings. Then the Sun seemed to stand still in its course, paralyzed and benumbed, shorn of its rays, and powerless for good or evil; while nature stood aghast, waiting the hidden agency which was to assert a new power. Days passed on upon the Ohio, and while a general gloom overshrouded the country. the issue was at last unexpectedly precipitated, and the whole valley of the W known in Northern America.

In 1831, nature here assumed the sam

mysterious garb, and those who remembered the disasters of New Madrid and the valley of the Mississippi, looked forward to a repetition of the same. At length tine. The sun, which rose clear and cloudless in the morning and reached the meridian in full glory, after passing it, began to assume a pale and sickly hue, and by four o'clock was totally deprived of all illuminating power. Day after day this was repeated. until the heart became sick with dread anticipation. Nor were fears misplaced or credulity too active. It was then, by a strange coincidence of horrors, that the murderous blows of Nat, Turner were struck, and the negroes of Southampton believed for a while that they were free men. Then, in this State, and Virginia, with the sky looming vengeance upon us, and encouraging the blacks to freedom, according to the reading of the oracle. were enacted those horrible tragedies, so eagerly sought to be renewed by the abolitionists of this day. No man went to his bed without placing his gun within reach, and no family separated for the night without dismal forebodings. The enemy was of their own household. But the defeat of the insurgents in Virginia, and summary panishment upon the rebellions in North Carolina, at length restored quiet, and though those disturbances will never be forgotten, they will be remembered as things that cannot be repeated.

While man reassumed his accustomed calm, nature proceeded to do the same, and after a daily obscurity of some weeks. the sun shone out with his usual brilliancy and fervor.
