HUSTLING AN ABOLITIONIST.

An individual by the name of Jeffries, Mon-Explosive Lamp, for a short time resident at Halifax, up e Road, rendered himself obnoxious, by the delivery of certain sentiments calculafed to arouse the ire of Southern people. escorted Mr Jeffries to the Depot for trans-portation to the more congenial North. -He indicated a preference to remain, but on the arrival of the upward train, he en route for Weldon, amid the parting farewells of his fellow citizens. "Goodbye, Jeffries." "Farewell, old fellow!" "Take care of yourself!" "Adieu, my friend." .. We like you pretty well. but you can't stay here." "Good-bye! Goodbye!" And away he went, baggage and all as fast as steam could carry him to Weldon.
