ereignty. Popular Sovereignty means the right of the people in a Territory to frame their own Constitution, and when framed, to ratify or reject it. If ratified, and accepted by Congress, it becomes the supreme law of a sovereign State; and if it abolishes of prohibits slavery-such being the will of a majority of the sovereigh people of a STATE-Congress will have no right to intervene, for the State must enjoy its rights -rights admitted and sanctioned by Congress

in accordance with Federal Constitution. But squatter sovereignty is a very different thing.
