President Winston, of the N. C. University, has been invited to address the Nineteenth Century Club, at New York. There was a special meeting of the Board of County Commissioners in this city yesterday which had for its purpose the investigation of the county poor house. In consequence, Mr. Jerre Sumnerlin was elected Superintendent of that institution, and it is the purpose of the Board to make it, by close business management, self-sustaining, instead of being a charge upon the taxpayers of the county, as it has been of late.

The friends of Rev. J. S. Dill in this city, where he was formerly pastor of the Baptist church, were glad to greet him on his arrival here yesterday afternoon and to see him looking so " hale and hearty." He says that Mrs. Dill, too, who was delicate when here, is in most excellent health in their California home, which will be a source of sincere pleasure to that good lady's hosts of friends among our people, where she will ever be held in affectionate regard, together with Mr. Dill.

It is with inexpressible regret and deep personal sadness that we chronicle this morning the death of Mr. Redding G. Pittman, which occurred Sunday afternoon at his home in Rocky Mount, of apoplexy, with which he was stricken Friday night, and remained unconscious till death. He was a highly cultured, generous-hearted, genial gentleman, and a devout, Godly man in his latter days. He was 53 years of age and was unmarried. None knew him but to love him, and in this city, as well as elsewhere throughout the State, where he had hosts of friends, his death will be sincerely mourned.

The tenacity with which President Harrison, as shown by his recent message to Congress, sticks to the high tariff and Force bill policies of his party, shows conclusively that he has not learned anything from the result of the election that defeated him for the Presidency. The man who seriously argues that the McKinley law embodies the idea of taxation to which this country will finally commit itself and who believes that the Force bill is both right and expeditious, fall far below the loosest definition of statesmanship, and stands convicted of being a narrow and bigotted partisan.

At the regular annual elective meeting of the lodge of the Ancient Order of United Workmen of this city the following officers were elected for the ensuing year: Maj. H. L. Grant, P. M. W.; C. J. Riverbark, M. W.; F. W. Hilker, Foreman; Rev. C. L. Hoffman, Overseer; Jos. Isaacs, Guide; Willis Edmondson, Recorder and Financier; I. Fuchter, Receiver. The appointive officers of the lodge have not yet been designated, and, consequently, will be published later. The A. O. U. W. has a \$2,000 insurance feature, and is one of the largest secret orders in the United States.

The Supreme Court of the United States, in an opinion delivered by Chief Justice Fuller on Monday last, affirmed the decision of the Supreme Court of North Carolina in the case of the Wilmington & Weldon Rail Road vs B. I. Allford, Sheriff of Halifax county, to the effect that the branch roads of that company do not come within the exemption claimed by the company for its main line under the charter granted fifty years ago, but that these new lines are subject to taxation like all other property in the State. This settles the mooted question—and the State is to be congratulated upon the valuable increment these taxes will be to her revenues.

The Bishop then called up the Presiding Elders and passed upon their characters, each one bringing a good report from his district, a noticeable feature of which was the large number of accessions to the church.
Revs. W. S. Rone and J. T. Gibbs were the only two Presiding Elders that reported district parsonages.
After these came the supernumerated list, each one being called out by name and his character inquired into by the Bishop. This was the most affecting scene of the day's proceedings: old men with hoary locks, who had given their lives for the cause of Christ, standing up and rendering an account of themselves for the past twelve months, with their countenances beaming with a radiance from on High, and speaking cheerfully of the hope that has cheered them on through the many dark and dismal days of their past life.

After the report of the venerable Rev. Marcus E. Thomas the Bishop led the Conference in singing "How firm a foundation."

When the name of Rev. J. H. Wheeler was called the secretary was instructed to read a communication from him, which expressed deep regret at not being able to attend, owing to continued ill health.
The name of Mr. J. F. Abernethy was called, and in response to the Bishop's inquiry as to character Rev. W. S. Rone rose and stated that there was a charge of immorality against Mr. Abernethy, and presented the secretary with all the papers relative to the case and stated that Rev. R. A. Willis had been appointed to prosecute Mr. Abernethy on the part of the Church.
On motion the Bishop was beseeched to appoint a committee of thirteen to judge the offense.

Next came the names of traveling preachers that had been elected elders and those that still remained on trial.
The Bishop stated, during the call for preachers on the first year of trial, that he had his first year of training in North Carolina.
Revs. Dr. Jno R. Brooks and A. P. Tyre, of the Western North Carolina Conference, were introduced by the Bishop and invited to seats in the Conference.
The various committee appointments were then announced, Revs. N. M. Watson and G. F. Smith appointed to preach at St. Paul and St. Job respectively, last night, and the Conference adjourned with the Benediction by the Bishop, to meet at 9:30 this morning.
