

CUBAN ANNEXATION.

In last Sunday's issue of the Philadelphia Times a correspondent in Havana writes on Cuban annexation with a degree of intelligence and sagacity that at once win the attention and hold the interest of every reader who keeps posted on international affairs in general.

The writer of the letter referred to is a native Cuban, prominently identified with the business interests of the island, and intelligently advised as to the present condition of the revolution and the sentiments of the people.

The present revolution, like all those that preceded it, is destined to fail. It is practically ended now, leaving only its dregs of guerrilla warfare in the Cuban mountains.

How the annexation of Cuba is to be brought about is not proposed by the correspondent. Our government could not take forcible possession of it without provocation or a clearly defined declaration of war.

It has been long agitated by some of our leading statesmen, prominent among whom has been Ex-Monroe Hewitt, of New York, and we doubt not that if Spain were to show a disposition to negotiate on reasonable terms, the annexation of Cuba to the United States by purchase could be accomplished within the next few years.
