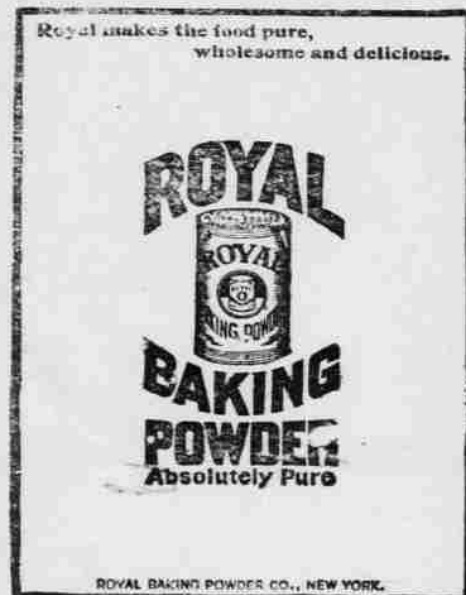

The wheat crop is very good. Would it not be well for the farmer to raise enough wheat for home consumption?

The rains appear to have been general. Cotton and corn in this section were not suffering much, but tobacco was needing rain very badly.

The housekeepers will soon be busy canning peaches. The crop is the largest for years, and the merchants are laying in large supplies of fruit jars in order to supply the trade.

Capt. James E. Britt, who was wounded in the battle of Santiago, is an old Goldsboro boy by birth, and spent his boyhood here. He is a brother of Mrs. Dr. A. C. Davis of this city. Capt. Britt has been in the regular army for years.

Mr. R. D. Kornegay has just brought here a lot of the finest sheep ever sold in this market. Mr. Kornegay lives in the Branches store neighborhood, in Duplin county. Day by day the farmers are finding out the only way to make money is to make cotton a surplus crop.

Mr. E. T. Atkinson, the county supervisor, spends every Saturday at the office of the Board of Education. The office is in the court house. By the way, the Board has a neatly furnished room, and the public schools of the county are managed in a business-like way.

Last year when the question of increasing the tax for school purposes was submitted to the people, under the act of the last Legislature, the people of Wayne county voted overwhelmingly against the measure. Not a single township was in favor of it. It seems that the people acted wisely. We are reliably informed that during the coming year our County Board of Education will be able with the funds to be apportioned to give every child in Wayne county a school term of nearly five months. This term is just as long as the people want, for the reason that they will not send their children for a longer period; in fact, many cannot spare the children for a longer time.

Water, electric lights and the telephone are necessities in every large town. All of these are too high in Goldsboro. The biggest burden this town has to carry is the expense of water. By the way, according to the contract, it is not about the expiration of ten years, the time when the city has the option to buy the water-works. The matter of water is a serious matter for this city. It is ridiculous that we have to buy water for sprinkling streets, fire purposes and the like, take Wilson for instance. Not only do the citizens get water much cheaper than do the people of Goldsboro, but the town gets water for fire purposes and town consumption absolutely free of cost. This is no theory. The facts show for themselves.

## SATURDAY SERMON.

For Sunday Pulpit and Every Day Guidance.

God created man to know, to love, and to serve Him in this world, and to be united with Him in the next. In order to love God, it is necessary to know Him, and to serve God, we must love Him; and upon our knowing and loving and serving Him faithfully and zealously here depends our bliss, that is, our reward hereafter.

The first thing, then, for us to do is to try to know God. God can be known in two ways, by two means, namely, by the light of reason and by the light of revelation. All men by the fact that they are intelligent creatures, are able to discover that there is a God, that is, a Supreme Being, infinite in all His perfections. Moreover, they can ascertain the following truths: That He is the Self-existing Being; that He is the Maker and Sustainer and Ruler of all things, visible and invisible; that He is all-wise and all-powerful and all-good; that we are united with Him by the relations of creator, servant, and child; and that a time will come when we shall be judged as to the manner in which we have discharged the duties and obligations connected with these relations.

This precludes any belief in more than one God, because the human mind is capable of forming the concept of two or more beings infinitely perfect in every respect. That is why not even the heathen commit the monstrous folly of bending the knee to more than one Supreme Being. It is true that the pagans profess and practice polytheism; but even they are careful to single out one Deity and lift Him far above the rest whom they worship as lesser or inferior gods, and pay to Him the adoration and service which belongs to the only true God.

Although this amount of knowledge is sufficient for the saving of our souls, yet it is not enough to satisfy the craving of the heart. We long to find out something more. But the light of reason is helpless to give us any further details. It is necessary to have recourse to the light of revelation, that is, the teaching of the Christian religion. Unaided reason is like the eye, it can see everything that comes within its ken; but both its range and power are very limited, and in order to perceive verities pertaining to God and a future state of life we need to ask the kindly assistance of a special and direct revelation. Hence it is that God in His boundless love has been pleased to reveal Himself to us more fully and plainly by the manifestation of the Second Person of the Adorable Trinity. By the Incarnation, Jesus Christ has opened up a way by which we may learn all that God wishes us to know concerning Himself and ourselves. He is the master

who teaches us the various lessons concerned Christianity. Without the advent of the Son of God in human form, and the founding by Him, before His Ascension into Heaven, of a properly organized institution, authorized to instruct mankind in matters relating to what they are bound to believe and to do, we should be badly off, as we could not possibly gain the same information from any natural source. With the appearance of the Christian Church we are taught the existence of the Third Person of the Eternal Trinity. It was the Holy Ghost who gave birth to the Church, and deigns to dwell in it, and be the bond of union and charity between its several members. Furthermore, by His indwelling the Church is rendered proof against heresy and schism, and the futile attempts to destroy it of all its enemies. It is because the Christian religion is given to us to be our guide and protector and comforter that we find so much malice and wrath directed against it. No surer proof is to be found to convince the honest and thoughtful inquirer than the imperishable nature of the Christian Church and the marvellous manner in which it is kept free from error in faith and morals.

## HAWAII ANNEXED

President McKinley Signs the Bill To-day.

Washington, July 7.—The bill providing for the annexation of Hawaii, which passed the Senate last night by a vote of 42 to 21, will be signed by the President to-day, and the Revenue cutter Optic will sail from San Francisco this afternoon for Honolulu to inaugurate the Hawaiian officials of the action of this government. She will arrive there next Tuesday morning, and Minister Hatch says the people will welcome annexation, and he expects to find the American flag displayed everywhere on his arrival.

## Hobson and Crew Exchanged.

Of Juraguag, July 7.—Hobson and his crew were exchanged yesterday by the Spanish authorities on even terms, man for man, according to rank. Hobson and his men were escorted through the lines by Captain Chadwick amid wild demonstration on the part of the troops. They were taken on board the New York, where they received a great ovation.

Hobson and his men are in excellent health, and he reports that they were well treated while in prison.

The department at Washington has been officially notified of the exchange.

## Courtesy in War.

War is brutal, yet among civilized people it develops a chivalrous sense that goes far to mitigate its brutality. We have an example of this in the universally kindly feeling toward Admiral Cervera. His courteous treatment in the American fleet—where he was received aboard the Iowa with all the honor due an admiral and escorted to the admiral's cabin as a distinguished guest—was only what was to be expected of the gentlemen of the navy, who are quick to appreciate the gallantry of an adversary. The courteous Captain Eulate, of the Vizcaya, had been received on the same ship with corresponding honors and the efforts of the officers and sailors to protect and succor their vanquished foes make a fine chapter in the history of war.

But what is still more impressive is the readiness of everybody to treat Cervera with distinguished honor, of a brave and chivalrous opponent who had proved his courage and his skill and was vanquished through no fault of his own. Through all the time that he kept our own navy guessing, we learned to respect him as an accomplished sailor; his ready recognition of Hobson's daring showed him a gentleman; this last desperate sortie, in obedience to orders, testified his bravery, and there is a universal demand that, as a prisoner of war, he and his gallant associates shall receive the highest consideration.

There is a worthy and honorable sentiment that is among the compensations of war. It typifies, we think, the general feeling of Americans toward the Spanish nation. Our antagonisms are intense and there have been manifestations of the Spanish character that are abhorrent to us. But we respect the desperate courage that Spain has shown, we are sorry for her sufferings, and when she has brought herself to acknowledge defeat, there will be an instant end of all bitterness on our side. Meantime we have nothing but appreciation for the gallant officer and gentleman, whoever he may be, who strive to do the full measure of his duty under adverse conditions, and as we would have our own heroes treated, so we will treat the heroes that we recognize among our adversaries.

San Francisco, July 9.—Gen. Otis reports favorable progress on the fourth Manila expedition. The fleet will probably be composed of six transports. Charleston, July 9.—General Miles sailed for Santiago this morning accompanied by the sixth Illinois and sixth Massachusetts batteries. New York, July 9.—The Clyde Line steamship Delaware has been totally destroyed by fire off Barnegat. All passengers were saved, but with great difficulty. Stanberry, Mo., July 9.—Floods here yesterday, caused by recent heavy rains, resulted in the death of five people. Stelville was almost destroyed, and several deaths reported. Queenstown, July 9.—The Cunard line steamer Catalonia, from Boston to Liverpool, arrived here this morning and reported a serious fire in her cargo at sea. A large number of bales of burning cotton had to be thrown overboard, and this caused quite a panic among the passengers, but their fears were quickly calmed.

## SPANISH SHIP DESTROYED.

Was Loaded With Ammunition and Supplies for General Blanco.

Was Blown Into Atoms.

Key West, July 9.—Officers of the blockading fleet report the destruction of the Spanish steamer Villa Verde, off Port Mariel, loaded with ammunition and supplies for Blanco. The vessel was sighted at midnight, and by Wednesday dawn was completely destroyed. The blockading steamship Hawk overhauled her steaming eastward close to the shore, and fired across her bows, which was ineffectual. The Hawk then opened fire in earnest disabling her and setting her on fire. The Spanish boat then ran ashore and beached. The Hawk was reinforced by the Castine, and a well-directed shot from the latter blew her to pieces.

A majority of the crew escaped, swimming ashore.

## To Go to Hawaii.

Washington, July 9.—Miller will probably sail in a few days on the Bennington to Hawaii to give official notice to the islanders of the action of Congress on the annexation. A New York syndicate tried to obtain four million Hawaiian bonds, but failed. No issue. The annexation of Hawaii has given American registry to fifty-three vessels.

## Hawaiian Commission.
