They are in a sense a missionary, whose work is as good as humanity. The influence of the book a girl or a boy instinctively hides whenever the parent approaches, is as pernicious as the companions they are ashamed to be seen in company with. Newspapers teem with accounts of boy burglars, thieves, embezzlers and some instances of murders. Girls who run away from school to be married, girls supposed to have been carefully reared in their homes, yet guilty of all kinds of indiscretions, these in most cases, come from the books they have read. The Rural Library is a step in the right direction, but does not begin to supply the need. The object of the Travelling Library is to put good books in every community in Wayne county, that will be accessible to all who desire to read them. Over one hundred new books are now ready to be sent out as soon as librarians can be secured to attend to them. The magazines and papers placed in the boxes at the postoffice and at waiting room at the depot are intended for any who may desire them.

The books for the central part of the town will be kept at the club room. Miss Annie Farrior will have charge of them and appoint one day of the week when they will be given out. One case will be kept at Edmondson Town another at Webtown, and any other point where needed and changed every six months.

Let every one bear in mind that books and magazines are gladly received by the Goldsboro Woman's Club and if you do not want the trouble of sending them give them to any member of the club whom you may chance to know.
