

**UNITED ON ALL ISSUES.**

**Cleveland's Great Address at the Tilden Club.**

New York, June 19.—Democratic unity was the keynote today of a great gathering of representative Democrats who had come to attend the opening of the handsome new quarters of the Tilden Club. Addresses were made by prominent Democrats and afterward a collation was served in the banquet hall to the distinguished guests of the evening and a buffet supper was served in the basement for the rank and file.

To Democrats the event was one of most memorable for many a day and Grover Cleveland and David B. Hill met in harmony, seeking to draw the factions of their party together. It was the first public political appearance of the ex-President in five years. He spoke first, ex-Senator Hill spoke after him and then Governor A. J. Montague, of Virginia, and Col. W. A. Gaston, of Boston, delivered addresses. Mr. Bryan had been invited to attend, but no reply was received from him. Cleveland and Hill shook hands most cordially.

**CLEVELAND'S ADDRESS.**

There was tremendous applause as Mr. Cleveland ascended the small platform. He said in part:

"The Democrat harmony of which we hear so much, cannot be effectively constructed by mathematical rule nor by a formal agreement on the part of those who have been divided, that there shall be harmony. It grows up naturally when true Democratic principles are plainly announced, when Democratic purposes are honestly declared, and, when as a result of these, confidence and enthusiasm stir the Democratic blood. It was such harmony as this, growing out of such conditions which with the battle cry of 'Tilden and Reform' gave us the Democratic victory of 1876 against odds great enough to discourage any but a harmonious Democracy, and against an opposing force broken and desperate enough to take from us by downright robbery what the voters of the land gave to us. \* \* \* \* \*

"Is it too much to ask our leaders to avoid paths that are known to lead to disaster? Is it too much to ask that proven errors be abandoned, and that we be delivered from a body of death, and relieved from the burden of issues which have been killed by the decrees of the American people? Ought we not to be fed upon something better than the husks of defeat? If these questions are met in an honest, manly fashion, I believe it will be productive of the best kind of Democratic harmony. \* \* \*

"My days of political activity are past, (Cries of no, no), and I shall not hereafter assume to participate in party counsels. I am absolutely content with retirement; but I still have one burning, anxious political aspiration. I want to see before I die the restoration to perfect health and supremacy of that Democracy whose mission it is to bless the people—a Democracy true to itself, untempted by clamor, unmoved by the gusts of popular passion and uncorrupted by offers of strange alliance—the Democracy of patriotism, the Democracy of safety, the Democracy that deserves and wins success."

**FROM ASHEVILLE TO FRISCO.**

Asheville, N. C., June 20.—The Asheville & Rutherfordton railway will be built, and active work on the proposed line will begin at once. The road will be built by George T. Canis of New York. The contract was signed today. A corps of engineers and workmen are in readiness to commence operations. Work on the proposed line will begin at the Rutherfordton end. The contract gives Mr. Canis about four years in which to complete the road. The line, however, will be completed in perhaps just half this time. The location of the line has not been determined. The road will run via Fairview and will enter Asheville from the southern part of the city.

"The building of this road means," said one of the parties directly interested in the movement, "that San Francisco and all principal points on the Pacific coast, as well as to principal cities on the Atlantic, may be reached from Asheville over this line without change of cars."

**ISTHMIAN CANAL PROJECT.**

**The Spooner Amendment to the House Bill Adopted by the Senate.**

Washington, June 19.—The Spooner amendment, as amended and adopted by the Senate to-day, provides that the President, through the law officers of the government, shall determine whether a clear title can be obtained to the Panama Company's property, rights and concessions. If he shall be satisfied that such title can be obtained, he shall purchase the property, rights and concessions for forty millions of dollars. If in his opinion, a clear title cannot be obtained, he shall proceed to construct an isthmian canal by the Nicaragua route. The bill further provides that a commission of seven shall be appointed by the President to supervise the work and to make arrangements for all the details of it. It also provides that gold bonds in the sum of \$130,000,000, bearing two per cent interest, shall be issued to raise money with which to construct the canal.
