Items of Interest Clipped From our State Exchanges.

Tarboro Southern—The directors of the Fountain Cotton Mills met Monday and placed contracts for the installation of additional machinery in the mills, as authorized by the stockholders. This means an addition of about 150 more spindles and an increase in the output of mills of about 20 per cent.

Weldon News—A petition is being circulated for signatures asking the town commissioners to call an election for the purpose of bonding the Weldon for \$20,000 to be taken in stock in a bridge to be built over Roanoke river at some convenient spot above the seaboard railroad bridge.

Charlotte Record—Mr. M. J. Jordan has bought the old Taylor place on Deep river, between Guilf and Brunswick. This tract contains over 15,000 acres, and for many years was supposed to have valuable coal deposits, but repeated efforts failed to develop enough to pay for mining. Mr. Jordan will put a saw mill there, for the timber is much more valuable than the coal.

Charlotte Chronicle—The cotton mill men drew upon Charlotte for a president for their association; the bankers did likewise, and now they have looked to Charlotte for a president of the State Medical Association. The officer was secured in Dr. E. C. Register and he will make a good one. The mill men, the bankers and the doctors have been fortunate in their respective elections.

Wilmington Star—Truckers complain that the excessive rains of the past week or ten days have seriously injured a number of crops. Snap beans, now about ready to ship, are rusting badly, and wax beans are practically ruined in many sections. Potatoes are also being badly damaged, but on account of the already over-production further South and the slump in consequence there of, very little complaint is being made.

Charlotte Observer—It is gratifying to see that the dignity of the profession is being conserved in the moonshine distrot. The editor of the Journal, of North Wilkesboro, and the editor of The Yadin Riddle, of Yadkinville, has each landed an appointment as a mail carrier on a rural free delivery route. These gentlemen should be congratulated for the stand they take at the next meeting of the State Press Association in rebuttal of the axiom that republics are ungrateful.

Scotland Neck Commonweal—It is the time when students from the various institutions in the country can soon enter upon a vacation of rest. Tired and worn and almost haggard from a year's hard study and with their constant grind of student work, they turn from the class room to the open for the deep inhalations of the fresh air the free exercise in the sunshine which they so much need. No one needs change and rest more than the student who has done full duty to the tasks of a year in college or high school.

Lumberton Robesonian—The law to suppress vagrancy passed by the Legislature was good a one. There are signs that it was demanded. The people endorse. We notice that there is a wide spread disposition to enforce. It is not only a good law for the towns but for the country also. We shall be surprised if the authorities in the rural districts do not see that offenders are dealt with. If certain named parties attempted to spend another winter like they spent the last they would be found in the coils and toils of the law. The moral sensibilities cry out that no man has a right to live as a parasite upon the body politic.

Howling Dingleyites. The Dingley tariff, which is constructed that it creates a heavy treasury deficit while it milks home consumers unmercifully, is on trial, and the moving party at present is Secretary Taft and the Panama canal commission. They say they cannot build the canal except at high figures if they are to be placed at the mercy of Dingleyism, and they have therefore wisely decided to seek ships and supplies in the markets of the world. This breach of the Chinese tariff wall by the republican administration is raising "a howl of protest" among those patriotic individuals who are standing pat on the sacred Dingley tariff. Their patriotism is confined, however, to the filling of their own pockets. Patriot Grosvenor is distressed by the administration's attitude, and no doubt Patriot Aldrich will be equally distressed as soon as he arrives in port. The gray wolves of the Senate will howl as they never howled before.
