## WON BY THOMASON

**JURY AWARDS HIM \$27,500 DAMAGES.**

An Effort Will be Made by the Southern's Attorneys to Have the Verdict Set Aside.

Ashville, N. C., Sept. 15.—The jury in the case of Ernest Thomason, of Old Fort, against the Southern Railroad Company returned a verdict this afternoon at four o'clock in favor of the plaintiff, awarding him \$27,500. Nine of the jurymen, stood out several hours for \$30,000. The suit was for \$30,000.

Ernest Thomason, a boy 18 years of age, and living at Old Fort, was injured on a turn-table, owned by the Southern Railway, six years ago. Several small boys, including the plaintiff's younger brother, were playing on the turn-table, and in turning it around the plaintiff's brother was in imminent danger of being crushed. The plaintiff, then twelve years old, rushed to the rescue, and in saving his brother was permanently injured. Negligence on the part of the defendant company was alleged by reason of failure to keep the turn-table braked.

The case was first tried before Judge Boyd. After hearing the evidence Judge Boyd instructed the jury to return a verdict for the railway company. An appeal was taken to the United States Circuit Court of Appeals and the decision by Judge Boyd was affirmed. The case was reinstated and tried before Judge Pritchard at this, the special term of United States Circuit Court. An appeal will be taken by the defendant.

Motion will be made before Judge Pritchard to-morrow to set the verdict aside. Attorneys for plaintiff say it is their opinion that the court will set down the amount of damages materially. The large verdict was a surprise.

### GOSSIP OF THE WORLD.

#### ITEMS OF INTEREST FROM DIVERS SOURCES.

The Latest Telegraphic News of the Day Boiled Down to a Focus For Busy Readers.

Washington, D. C., Sept. 15.—Mr. Yerkes told me this afternoon that he had ordered the summary dismissal of every revenue employee indicted by the grand jury at Greensboro last week.

It is related that Miss Alice Roosevelt jumped into a swimming tank on the deck of the steamship Manchuria with all her clothes on, after Congressman "Nick" Longworth had refused to take a "dare". The latter leaped in, also with his clothes on, and helped the President's daughter out of the water. So like her dear father, daughter-look!

Ashville, N. C., Sept. 15.—The wrestling match here tonight between Prof. Ono, of Japan and Prof. Olsen of Chicago, was witnessed by a large audience and was won by Olsen. The match was wrestled under the pure rules and was a rough and brutal.

St. Louis, Mo., Sept. 15.—A deal was concluded yesterday whereby the old Grand farm in St. Louis county, a short distance west of the city limits, for many years the home of President Ulysses S. Grant, will be converted into an amusement park. The contract comprises about 440 acres and the purchase price was \$113,000.

Charlotte, N. C., Sept. 15.—The Mocklenburg chapter, Daughters of the Revolution, is shortly to place a marker at the birthplace of Andrew Jackson in Union county, and in the near future, as soon as sufficient funds have been raised, they propose to erect a monument that will mark the spot where the great president was born.

London, Sept. 15.—A dispatch to the Central News from Rome says that two violent shocks of earthquake in Calabria yesterday did great damage to the towns of Palmia and Pizzo and destroyed the town of Monte Rosso. The details so far are unknown. It is believed that a large number of people have been killed.

Winchester, Mass., Sept. 15.—An automobile containing members of the party accompanying Governor R. B. Glenn, of North Carolina, plunged over a bridge on the road to Royalston here today and landed at the bottom of a ditch, plunging the occupants underneath. The injured are: J. C. McNeill, special staff correspondent of the Charlotte N. C. Observer, badly cut about the head. Guy Townshead of Winchester, head cut and bruised. Owen Hoban, lawyer, of Winchester, knee injured and back sprained. The motor car, containing Governor Glenn, was directly behind the automobile which met with the accident and only the prompt action of the chauffeur averted a collision between the two cars as the first automobile swerved from its course and crashed into the ditch carrying its passengers. It is believed that all the injured will recover.
