A SAD ACCIDENT.—Yesterday, (Thursday) morning, as the regular mail and passenger train from the West, was within a few miles of Goldsboro, a colored brake-man, named Henry Morehead, while on the top of a car, engaged in taking up the bell-rope, lost his balance and fell between the cars. As soon as the accident was discovered Captain Green, the efficient conductor in charge of the train, at once had the engine reversed and when the body of the unfortunate was found it presented a most heart-rending spectacle. Both legs had been cut off and the body was otherwise terribly mangled. Death must have been instantaneous.

TRANSPARENT LEMON JELLY.—Two dozen as thin as possible, eight lemons with the rinds not boiling water; cover it three hours. Rub some loaf sugar rinds before peeling, to extract flavor, put in a china dish with a half of fine sugar, then water and three quarts of boiling mix and pour through a cily clear.

The Rutherford Indicator says: "There was a heavy frost in Transylvania County on the 7th of August, doing considerable damage to the growing corn, and in some places completely killing it."

A New Orleans paper estimates that there are not enough field hands at work in the cotton States to pick 3,000,000 bales of cotton, at which amount Northern papers place the incoming crop.

ROAD DUST AND VEGETATION.—No careful observer will deny that the trees along much frequented roads, especially when exposed to the influence of prevailing winds, distinguish themselves in the rapidity of their growth and the luxuriance of their foliage as being more thriving than those of the neighboring wood. This fact is being ascribed to the dust from the roads which is carried and deposited by the wind upon their branches and foliage. Dry road dust contains 8 to 10 per cent. of organic matter, arising from the excrements of animals, from straw, hay, or grass which may have fallen from wagons frequenting the road. After having been pulverized by carriage-wheels to a fine dust, they form a large amount of already decomposed and readily soluble nourishment for vegetable growth. Roads kept in good condition are therefore not only important promoters of the civilization of the district wherein they are located on account of easier transportation, but also of an inexpensive but not less efficient fertilizer. It is such, at the first, unapparent causes that an explanation of many of the declared mysteries of vegetation may be found.—MANUFACTURER AND BUILDER.

A STRANGE PROCEEDING.—It leaked out, during the trial of the Lenoir county prisoners, that two men, Joshua Suggs and Mason Sutton, who had been brought to the city for the purpose of turning State's evidence, "cut sick" and took their way back to their native woods as fast as a hand car would carry them, on Sunday night. Thomas Watkins, another witness on the same footing with Suggs and Sutton, accompanied them, but afterwards returned.

When the fact of these witnesses being absent was divulged, yesterday, Judge Green very plainly intimated that he believed they had been spirited away by the prosecution, and by those who desired to see the prisoners convicted. The car upon which they escaped, was furnished by R. W. King, Collector of Customs, and other circumstances connected with the affair, gave probability to Judge Green's conclusion, that their escape was winked at.

This affair is a strange one, and we believe it to be deeper than it appears to be. These witnesses, Suggs and Sutton, were highly important and it is somewhat remarkable that no steps were taken to detain them until their testimony was given.—Newbern Journal.

CHAPTER OF ACCIDENTS.—Last Sunday, while the entertainment of our Norfolk guests went off most pleasantly and harmoniously, without any difficulty or disaster of any kind, seems to have been a day of accidents outside of that. Capt. James Farrow and Henry Stewart both of this place, had an affray, in which the former was dangerously stabbed with a knife. Stewart was confined in prison, to await the result of the threatening wound which he had inflicted. Also on the same day, a child of Mr. Jackson cut off his toe with a me sharp instrument dropped upon it. And the Doctor had not more than bound up that wound, before he was called to another little fellow who had scalped himself by pulling a table on his head.—Washington (N.C.) Intelligencer.

A HORRIBLE TRAGEDY.—In east St. Louis, on Sunday morning, Caspar Waltz attempted to kill his step-son, Nicholas Lutz, with a hatchet. The weapon glanced, and Lutz escaped and ran for a policeman. When they returned, they found Mrs. Waltz lying on the floor, with her head chopped to pieces. After committing this deed, Waltz walked to the railroad track, near by, and threw himself across the track. A train passed over his neck, completely cutting off his head. He was a hard drinker, and did the above under the influence of rum.

A gentleman called on a rich miser and found him at the table, endeavoring to catch a fly. Presently he succeeded in entrapping one, which he immediately put in the sugar bowl, and shut down the cover. The gentleman asked for an explanation of his singular sport. "I'll tell you," replied the miser, a triumphant grin overspreading his countenance as he spoke, "I want to ascertain if the servants steal the sugar."
