The springs are near the river, at the base of seven hills, which overlook H. L. Spicer, work of hands on them. Some will ask why they are called the "Seven Springs." As you descend the hill from the hotel, you come to a level tract of land containing several acres, shaded with a beautiful grove of oak and hickory. At the edge of this tract, near the river, are seven springs, enclosed by an airy summer house about 18x20 feet. No two springs, though so near together, have the same analysis. This may be accounted for by the supposition that each spring has a different originprobably each one has its source in one of the seven adjacent hills. This is a strange coincident—seven springs and seven adjacent hills overlooking

These springs afford a bountifal supply of water to relieve the aches and pains of the many invalids who avail themselves of them. Probably here the Indians resorted to cure themselves of indigestion after partaking of too much venison; or of nervousness from loss of sleep and from fatigue. Anyway, we do know that Indians did inhabit these hills, and, too, that the waters cure such diseases now, as those who have been here will


