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McCLAMMY NOMINATED.
The Congressional Convention of the Third District.
We had hoped to be able to lay the official proceedings of the Clinton convention before our readers, but up to the hour of going to press, they have not been received.

Bruce Williams, Esq., of Pender county, was made permanent chairman, and the two-thirds rule prevailed. Of the candidates Messrs. Green, Dortch and McLean were at the scene of the contest.

—On the first ballot Col. Green had 198 votes, lacking only 30 to secure the nomination; after that his vote ranged from 185 to 189, excepting one ballot when his vote was reduced to 145, by Duplin voting for Prof. B. F. Grady.
