The Week's Cleanings from Our Exchanges

Items of Interest the State Over.

The new court house in Union is to cost \$20,000.

Laurinburg Exchange: Laurinburg sent \$110 to the Charleston suffers this week.

It is said that there are immense beds of oysters at sea, off the coast of Dare county.

The earthquake cracked the jail of Perquimans county, at Hertford, from top to bottom.

Asheville Citizen: The worst results of the earthquake are yet to come. The poems are making their appearance.

Elizabeth City Economist: The Albermarle & Pamlico Railroad, now in course of construction from Mackerly's Ferry to Pantego, by J. L. Roper & Co., is an important public improvement for Hyde and lower Beaufort counties.

Charlotte Chronicle: The first attempt made by Mr. J. S. Collins to raise bright tobacco has demonstrated the fact that Mecklenburg soil is admirably adapted to the successful growth of this crop. Other farmers in this county will also verify this fact.

Wadesboro Times: The next State Senate will be a strong body. Already we notice among the nominees such strong names as Adams of Union, London of Chatham, Shober of Rowan, Alexander of Mecklenburg, Rufus Jones of Wake, Pon of Johnston, and others of like character.

Raleigh News-Observer: Mr. Omega Foster, who is certainly an interesting man, will establish a cotton compress here, and has now gone North to purchase the machinery. The cotton exchange has officially endorsed the plan. It is expected that the compress will be up by the middle of next month.

Alamance Gleaner: The cotton manufacturers in this county have heretofore been running 70 hours per week; but a regulation is just going into effect reducing the time to 66 hours per week, with no reduction in wages. This course is very commendable on the part of the mill men; which will give operatives more pay for the time at work.

Progressive Farmer: A corps of surveyors, under orders from the Richmond and Danville railroad company, arrived in Winston today to begin a survey of a line from here to Wilkesboro, with a view to an extension of the Northwestern North Carolina road to that point. The line will be run by way of Old Richmond and thence up the Yadkin valley.

Greensboro Workman: Married, in this city, at half-past 7 o'clock this morning, at the residence of R. M. Sloan, Sr., father of the bride, Mr. John A. Harringer to Miss Mattie M. Sloan, Rev. Cornelius Miller, officiating. The wedding was quite a quiet one, only a few friends being present. The happy pair left on the Northern bound train for an extended tour to places of interest in the North.

The Jones county correspondent of the New Berne Journal says a fatal accident occurred in Tuckaohoe township, at the home of Mr. Gibbons Eubank. Mr. Eubank was out in his field, and when he returned to his home missed his wife and enquired of the children where she was. They told him the last they saw of her was at the well. Stepping out, he saw at the well that the bucket was off and some of the planks of the curb were torn off. He looked in the well and saw his wife drowned. It is supposed she was drawing water and the bucket falling off, she slipped and was precipitated into the well head foremost.

Wilmington Star: The News and Courier announces that the Charleston barges are all right, with plenty of water. This is just what Albert told us when he got back, except that he didn't say much about water. Articles of incorporation were filed yesterday for the "Fore and Foster Planning Mill and Sash and Blind Company." The incorporators are Messrs. Jas. A. Fore, F. W. Foster and Charles H. Fore. The works of the company are located at the place formerly known as the tobacco factory, in the northeastern part of the city. The company will deal in all kinds of lumber, and manufacture doors, sash, blinds, moulding, brackets, scrolls, and other fancy wood work.

Clinton Caucasian: Maj. Chas. W. McClammy opened his canvass at Kenansville, Duplin county, on the 7th inst. He spoke three-fourths of an hour. He did not attempt to discuss the issue of the day at all exhaustively, but rather made a speech of congratulation to the Democratic party and the country for the changed condition of affairs since the dark days of Republican misrule. He touched on Civil Service Reform. He honored President Cleveland for enforcing the law, but he does not believe in a civil service reform that keeps Republicans in office and Democrats out in the cold. He made a good impression upon the people, and the Democrats of Duplin are going to vote for him as one man.

Wilmington Review: We understand that the board of directors of the Wilmington, Onslow and East Carolina Railroad, have requested Mr. H. A. Bagg, chairman of the board of county commissioners, to call a meeting of the board on Friday for the purpose of considering the matter of submitting the question of a subscription by the county to that road to the people for their decision. The necessary papers have been out some days, and it is understood that the signatures of at least one-fifth of the qualified voters of the county, asking that the election be ordered, will be presented at the meeting. Full returns from the election held in Brunswick county yesterday, on the question of a subscription of \$100,000 on the part of the county to the capital stock of the South Atlantic and Northwestern Railroad Company, are not yet in, but enough is known to justify the assertion that the subscription has been carried by an overwhelming vote—practically a unanimous one.
