## ANOTHER GREAT BATTLE

### 40,000 Yankees Captured!

MARTINSBURG, July 6. At six p. m. Saturday, Gen. Lee had changed his front, occupied the ground of the enemy, driving them from their first and second positions. The whole of our army are in splendid spirits, and masters of the situation. Gen. Pender and Pickett wounded, Col. Avery, Six A. M. Reports concur that the enemy were defeated yesterday, and driven 3 miles. Vast numbers of prisoners reported to be taken by Gen. Lee.

LATER. RICHMOND, July 7.

Another telegram dated Martinsburg 6th, says the latest news which seems reliable, is that the fight on Sunday was the bloodiest of the war.

Ill fell back in the center, causing the enemy to believe he was retreating, and the enemy advanced. Then Ewell and Longstreet advanced, right and left wings, surrounding the enemy.

We took the Heights for which we have been contending, and captured 40,000 prisoners! They refused parole.

Pickett's division are now guarding the prisoners. The prisoners refuse to be paroled on their way to Richmond. This is the bloodiest battle of the war. Our loss very great, and the enemy's immense.

LATEST.

On Saturday night our centre fell back drawing the enemy from their works. Ewell and Longstreet flanked the enemy and gained the heights.

A general fight ensued resulting in the route of the Yankees. Lee captured forty thousand prisoners.

### Lee's Victory Confirmed!

RICHMOND, July 7.

A telegram, dated Martinsburg 6th, says in the fight on Sunday Lee captured 40,000 prisoners. Fuller particulars this afternoon.

According to all accounts there has been a fight at Williamsport between Imboden's cavalry and several regiments of infantry and a division of Yankee cavalry under Pleasant.

### From Vicksburg.

ROLLING'S STATION, (via Jackson), 5.

On yesterday about 12 o'clock the Yankee cavalry crossed the Big Black at Birdsong's Ferry, and advanced into the interior, but were promptly met by Whitfield's brigade and driven back across the river.

A courier just in from Edward's depot says Osterhouse's entire command crossed near that place last night. If so we will have warm work today.

Grant is evidently very uneasy in regard to events transpiring in his rear. Very little firing at Vicksburg yesterday.

### Reported Fall of Vicksburg!

JACKSON, July 6.

Several reports have just arrived and states positively that Vicksburg had fallen. This same news has been received this morning from different sources, but not by any one here officially.

### Latest from Below.

GOLDSBORO, July 7.

The Yankee Raiders have gone safe. A large force of Yankees, estimated at 5000, came out as far as Trenton to succor or cover retreat.

Gen. Martin sent a force to intercept them at Free bridge, when they found the Yankees posted in force. Drove in the Yankee pickets, but finding the Raiders coming up in their rear fell back. An animated artillery skirmish ensued. Our men behaved gallantly. No casualties reported.

Free bridge, over Trent river, is ten miles S. W. of Trenton and 12 miles S. E. of Kingston.

### LATEST FROM THE NORTH.

Great Excitement in Baltimore! Lee Threatens the City.

The Yankees Evacuating Virginia and going to Maryland.

RICHMOND, July 7.

The Baltimore News of the 1st says Stuart captured 1200 mules and four hundred prisoners in Montgomery county, on Monday. At Westminster he captured a detachment of cavalry.

The wildest alarm prevails in Baltimore. The streets are barricaded. Lee is threatening the city. The papers are filled with extracts this morning.

The New York papers, with the third, fourth, and last dispatches, refer to the fighting of Friday.

A Washington telegram of the third says: Latest intelligence here up to 11 o'clock to-day. Purport not given.

Dix's troops are believed to be evacuating Virginia and are en route to Maryland.

Railroad and telegraph communication with the Valley of Virginia resumed.

### Later from the North--Important.

PETERSBURG, July 7.

A flag of truce boat was at City Point this morning. No papers were allowed to come. Officers dejected.

Capt. Milford states that Sickles is dead. Paroled prisoners overheard one Federal say that thirty thousand killed, wounded and missing.

### Still Later from the North.

RICHMOND, July 7.

The Tribune of the 4th contains many details of the battle on Wednesday.

Brigadier General Barlow was twice wounded and taken prisoner. Brig. Gen. Schamseferring is a prisoner. Gen. Meredith wounded.

A telegram from Hanover of the 3rd, says that the fight was the most terrific. Loss on both sides tremendous. We have Longstreet prisoner, sure. If a courier arrives to-night, the victory is ours beyond chance.

Philadelphia, 3d, 11 p. m.--Stirring rumors in town. The report is current that Longstreet is killed.

The case of Vicksburg is said to be progressing satisfactorily, but the rebels are regarded as very obstinate.

New Orleans dates to the 27th, say nothing new from Port Hudson. The rebels have overrun the country.

### YANKEES TO BE SHOT IN RICHMOND.

RICHMOND, July 7.

A drawing took place yesterday at the Libby prison for two Federal Captains to be executed in retaliation for the shooting of two Confederate officers in Kentucky by Burnside. Two names drawn, Henry M. Sawyer, First New Jersey cavalry and John Fynn 51st Indiana. No day fixed for the execution.

Community disposed to await official confirmation before fully crediting Martinsburg telegram.

It is generally believed, however, that a decisive victory was achieved. The report from City Point regarded as a partial confirmation of the news.

### Confederate.

It is reported that the Confederate Government has ordered the arrest of all persons engaged in the sale of goods to the enemy. The list of names includes: Auctioneers, apothecaries, billiard rooms, commission merchants, and commercial brokers, cattle breeders, confectioners, dentists, distillers, hotels, inns, taverns, eating houses, jewelers, exhibitors of shows, lawyers, livery stable keepers, pawnbrokers, peddlers, physicians, photographers, retailers, surgeons, theatres, tobacconists, and wholesale dealers. The gross amount of sales from the 24th April to the 30th June 1863, both days inclusive, will be required to be listed and the tax paid on the same.

Returns will also be required of all profits made by a person, partnership or corporation during the year 1863 by the purchase within the Confederate States and sales, during the said year, of any of the following articles, viz: flour, corn, bacon, pork, oats, hay, rice, salt, iron, the manufactures of iron, sugar, molasses made of cane, leather, wadded clothes, shoes, boots, blankets, and cotton clothes; the tax upon the said profits is ten per cent.

The law imposes a double tax on all persons who are enumerated falling to pay their taxes at the time appointed, and it is imperative on the collector to enforce the law.

### To Farmers and Quartermasters.

ASSISTANT QUARTERMASTER GEN'S. OFFICE, RICHMOND, Va., 12th June, 1863.

### TAX IN KIND.

THE following is the system adopted for the collection of the tax in kind:

An officer of the Quartermaster General's Department is assigned to the special charge of the subject. A controlling Quartermaster, with the rank of Major, is assigned to each State, and a Post Quartermaster, with the rank of Captain, to each Congressional District, where it is practicable to collect the tax.

Each Congressional District will be subdivided by the Post Quartermaster in charge of it into sections, for the convenient delivery by the tax-payer of his quota of produce, and agents will be appointed by that officer to take charge of the depots to be established in each section.

Before these depots can be established, or the assessments required under the law be made, the crop of grain, hay and the clip of wool for the present year will have been secured.

To relieve farmers from the risk and inconvenience of storing the Government portion, as well as to obtain the convenient delivery by the tax-payer of the Department, the Quartermaster receiving produce under this rule will give receipts to the producer as evidence that so much of his tax is paid. And as the Post Quartermaster of the Congressional District is responsible for the tons, after the assessor has established and marked it known to him, the Quartermaster to whom the produce is delivered will also receipt for it to the Post Quartermaster of the District, who will endorse a copy of the receipt upon the assessor's estimate before transferring it to the agents at the receiving depot.
