It is ordered by the Court that in all Sequestration cases where decrees were entered in any of the Courts of this District, at Spring Term, 1867, or at any previous term, the defendents pay to the Receivers in their several Districts, on or before the 1st of September next, the interest up to the 20th of May 1863, that has accrued on the principal sums due, as set forth in said decrees, and the Receivers are hereby directed to attend at the Court House of each county in their several Districts to receive payment thereof. (Of the time and place they shall give notice in at least three public places in the county for 20 days.) Of all payments made to them the receivers shall immediately notify the clerk of the Court where the decree is entered; and the Clerks after the first of September next shall issue executions in all cases for the interest aforesaid which has not been paid to the Receivers; and the costs of issuing and collecting such executions shall be paid by the collection of the tax in kind:

An officer of the Quartermaster General's Department is assigned to the special charge of the subject. A controlling, Quartermaster, with the rank of Major, is assigned to each State, and a Post Quartermaster with the rank of Captuin, to each Congressional District, where it is practicable to collect the tenth.

Each Congressional District will be subdivided by the Post Quartermater in charge of it into sections, for the convenient delivery by the tax-payer of his quota of produce, and agents will be appointed by that officer to take charge of the depots to be established in each section.

Before these depots can be established, or the assessments required under the law be made, the crops of small grain hay and the clip of wool for the present year will have been secured.
