No. 15.

In compliance with an Act of the recent are medered to enroll as a guard for Houn Dryince all white male persons not already enrolled in the zervice of the Confederate States, between the ages of 18 and 50 years, includidg foreigners not naturalized who have been residents of the State for thirty days before said enrollment.

II. There shall be exempt from the operations of this order the Governor, the Judges of the Supreme and Su-perior Courts of Law and Equity, Members of the Gen-eral Assembly, the Officers of the several Departments of the Government, Members of Congress, Civil and Milita-ry Officers of the Confederate Government in the State, the Ministers of the Gospel of the several Religious De-nominations of the State, charged with the duties of such ministry, the high Sheriff and Clerks of the several Courts of Record, and the Public Registers in the several

counties. III. After enrollment the men enrolled shall be divided into Companies of not less than seventy-five men, nor into Companies of not less than seventy-five men, nor more than one hundred, and shall proceed to elect their Company Officers. The certificates of such election will be forwarded to this Office with the papers of enrollment, in order that Commissions may be issued. IV. Officers of she Militia will be enrolled for HOME DAFENCE, and their Commissions, when called into service will be suspended only during the period of such service. V. This order is not intended to interfere with the en-

V. This order is not intended to interfere with the enrollment for immediate service, those between the ages of 40 and 45 years under Order No. 13.

General Orders; No. 13.

The Commanding Officers of the Militia are ordered to enrol all able bodied white men between the ages of forty aud forty-five years, who are subject to the Conscript Act. Those who are exempt from military daty by the exemption acts of Congress, are not to be en-rolled under this order.

II. In addition to the exemptions under said act, heretofore published, are the following exempted under act of the Congress, and approved April 30th, 1863 : Justices of the Peace, County Trustees, County Solicitors, Coroners, Registers, Tax Collectors, one Deputy Sheriff in each county where there is no Tax Collector, Constables now in office, one Deputy Cerk for each Court when the Court may request it, one County Commissioner for each county for distributing morey and provisions among soldiers' families, Agents appointed under act of Legislature for any public duty, Militia officers, Mayor and Police of Ralcigh, Wilmington, Fayetteville, Salisbury and Charlotte, Counsel-lors of State, Board of Internal Improvements, Literary Board, and the Employees of the State Government in the different departments.

Gen. Johnston sent out a flag of truce to-day to Grant, asking permission to bury the Yankee dead in front of our works. Grant asked permission to send assistance in order to recognize his dead which was refused. The first terms were then agreed to .--Our troops were engaged all the afternoon in burying them. The exact number is not ascertained yet. The Yankee officers in charge of the flag admit a loss of four to five hundred.

Among their killed and wounded are Col. Earl, Lieut. Col. Long and Capt. Hall, 41st Illinois; Lieuts. S. Smith and McMasters, 53d Illinois; and Lieut. Abenathy, 8d Iowa.

Among our officers are Maj. Lamb, 20th Ga., killed; Lieut. C. C. Braden, 19th La.; T. J. Bust, 4th Fla., and B. A. James, Cobb's Ky. battery, wounded. The time specified passed before the burying was finished.

### BY THE GOVERNOR OF NORTH CAROLINA. A PROCLAMATION.

WHERREAS, for the protection of our people, as far as possible, against the evils of speculation, there continues to be necessity to prohibit the exportation of certain articles of our products beyond the limits of our State : \*

Now, therefore, I, ZEBULON B. VANCE, Governor of North Carolina, do issue this Proclamation, continuing the proclamation of June 8th in force for thirty days from and after the 13th instant, in regard to Cotton and Woolen Cloth, Cotton and Woolen Yarns, Leather and Shoes, subject to such exceptions, &c., as have been ex-pressed in my proclamations heretofore on the subject of exportation.

THE following is the system adopted for the collection of the tax in kind :

An officer of the Quartermaster General's Department is assigned to the special charge of the subject. A con-trolling Quartermaster, with the sank of Major, is as-signed to each State, and a Post Quartermaster with the rank of Captain, tyeach Congressional District, where it s practicable to collect the tenth.

Each Congressional District will be subdivided by the Post Quartermater in charge of it into sections, for the convenient delivery by the tax-payer of his quota of pro-duce, and agents will be appointed by that officer to take charge of the depots to be e tablished in each section.

Before these depots can be established, or the assessments required under the law be made, the crops of small grain hay and the clip of wool for the present year will have been secured.

Torelieve farmers from the risk and inconvenience of storing the Government portion, as well as to obtain immediate supplies for the use of the army, the Department authorizes and requests farmers residing near posts where Quartermasters are now stationed to deliver the Govern-

ment's tenth, or any part of it to that Qua termaster. Under the law, farmers are required to deliver their tenth at depots not more than eight miles from the place of production. If they will deliver under this request, the Government will pay for the transportation in excess of eigh miles. The Quartermaster receiving produce under this rule will give receipts to the producer as evidence that so much of his tax is paid. And as the Post Quartermaster of the Congressional District is responsible for the tenth, after the assessor has established and made it known to him, the Quartermaster to whom the produce is delivered will also receipt for it to the Post Quartermaster of the Disalso receipt for it to the Post Quartermisser of the pas-trict, who will endorse a copy of the receipt upon the as-sessor's estimate before transferring it to the agents at the receiving depot.
