## Confederate Laws.

AN ACT MAKING APPROPRIATIONS TO MEET THE INCR ASE OF PAY AUD OR-IZED BY THE ACT OF CONGRESS, ENTITLED WAN ACT TO INCREASE THE PAY OF OERTAIN OFFICERS AND EM-PLOYEES IN THE EXECUTIVE AND LEG-ISLATIVE DEPARTMENTS "APPROVED OCTOBER THIREENTH, EIGHTEEN HUN-DRED AND SIXTOTWO.

The Congress of the Confederate States of Ameri-ca do enact, That the following amounts be paid. out of any money not otherwise appropriated, to wit :

For deficiency in appropriation for compensation of the Secretary of the Treasury, Assistant Secretary, Comptroller, Auditors, Treasurer and Register, and clerks and messangers in the Treas ury Department, from the thirteenth of October eighteen handred and sixty-two, to January the thirty-first, eighteen hundred and sixty-three, to wit: far increase of pay of clerks, &c., under the act aforesaid, sixty-eight thousand dollars.

For deficiency in appropriation for compensa-tion of the Secretary of War, Assistant Secretary, Chief of Bureaus, clerks, messengers, &c., from the thirteenth Oct'br, eighteen handred and sixty-two, to January the thirty-first, righteen hundred and sixty-three, to wit: for increase of pay of clerks, &c., under the act aforesaid, twenty-one thousand, eight hundred and eighty eight dollars and twonty-three cents.

For deficiency in appropriation for compensation of the clerks, messengers and laborers in the Post Office Department, from the thirteenth October, eighteen hundred and sixty-two, to January the thirty-first, eighteen hundred and sixty-three, seven thousand, seven hundred and fifteen dollars and twenty-four cents.

For deficiency in appropriation for compensation of the clerks and employees in the Navy Department, from the thirteenth October, eighteen hundred and sixty-two, to January the thir ty-first eighteen hundred and sixty-three, nine hundred and seventy-three dollars and lifteon cents. AN ACT TO PROVIDE FOR TRANSPORTA TION OF PERSONS WHO HAVE BEEN MUSTERED INTO THE SERVICE FOR THE WAR.

The Congress of the Confederate States of Amerido enact. That non-ecomissioned officers and rivates who have been mustered into service for war, and to whom furio ughs may be granted for not more than sixty days, shell be entitled to transportation home and back: Provided, That this allowance shall only be made once during the term (f enlistment of such non-commissioned offi cers and privates.

## Confederate Laws.

### INo. 90. an Act to Authorize the Establishment An Act to Abolish all Ports of Delivery of Express Malls.

The Congress of the Confederate States of Ameri-ca do enact, That the Postmaster General be, and he is hereby, authorized, if found practicable and necessary, to establish express mails for the conveyance of letters and government dispatches only, as a means of securing greater dispatch than can be afforded by the regular mails; and the lines of express mails so established shall be deemed post routes.

SEC. 2. The rates of postage on such lines shall be fixed by the Postmaster General, but shall not exceed one dollar on a single letter not exceeding in weight one half ounce, and at the same rate for any additional half ounce or fraction of a half ounce, for any distance not exceeding five hundred miles and for any distance exceeding five hundred miles double the said rate to be so fixed. . Provided, This law shall not repeal the laws now in force regulating the ordinary mail service. Approved May 1,1863. nov 5-law2w.

[No. 93.] An act to Continue and amend the Third Section of an Act Supplementary to an Act concerning the Pay and Allowance due to Deceased Soldiers, Ap-proved February 15th, 1862, and to Provide for the Prompt Settlement of Claims for Arrearages of Pay, Allowance and Bounty due Deceased Officers and Soldiers.

The Congress of the Confederate States of Amer-ica do exact, That the third section of an act entitled "An Act supplementary to an act concerning the pay and allowance due to deceased soldiers," approved February 15th, eighteen hundred and sixty-two, and to provide for the prompt ettlement of claims for arrearages of pay, llowance and bounty due decensed officers and soldiers, be continued of force until otherwise provided by Congress.

That no officer charged with the safe keeping transfer or disbursement of public moneys, or charged with or assigned to the duty of purchasing for the government or any department thereof shall buy trade, traffic or speculate in, either directly or individely for the purpose of gain to himself or others by re-sale or otherwise, any article of food or clothing or material of which the same is made, or which enters into or constitutes a part of the same, or any material of war br article whatsoever, which is or may be required to be purchased for the use of the army or the prosecution of the war.



## Military Notices.

THE OFFICE OF CHIEF CONTROLLING 1 Quartermaster, Richmond, Va.-For the Col-lection of Tithes, directs that the following be published with the view of eliciting information on the subject from the farmers of North Carolina. The plan proposed is from a leading farmer in Hanover County, Va. SEPT. 15, 1863 .- Those most successful in keep-

ing sweet potatoes during the winter, in Hanover county. Va., adopt this : In a high, dry spot, excavate a hole of convenentsize and shape, to the depth of four or five feet- Put in a layer of pine tags, say three inches thick, the sides also monid be lined with the same as the potatoes are put in. After the hole is filled to within one foot of the surface, and a shelter to keep off the rain rected; the potatoes are allowed to remain untounched for about a week, to undergo what is called the sweat. Then pine tags and thrown into the bole even with the surface, and plank laid over. It is of the greatest importance that no vater should run in upon the potatoes, and they should not be moved or touched until taken out for use. Pine tags, the best non-. conductor, are universally used in Hanover. The usual country shelter is made of top fodder and corn stalks. Before the potatoes are put in the hole, each one should be rubbed with the hand, taking off all dirt and roots. The potatoes should not be washed or bruised in any manner. GEORGE H. FITZWILSON.

It will be seen that it is the intention of the Department to raise a Battalion of mounted men for special service in North Carolina, and the Commandant hopes that all able bodied men, who may be exempt by reason, of having furnished substitutes or otherwise, will not shrink

from this call, but will hasten to enlist in the defense of their homes, their figesides and the State that gave them birth:

Parties enlisting in this Battalion will be exempt from duty in the Militia and Home Guard, and will receive the pay and allowance of caralrymen, The Engotting Officers throughout the State are authorized to receive rescuits, or they may report directly at either of the Camps of Instruction.
