Increase of Neft Revenue ..... \$180,250 10 The cost of operating the road, including the cost of two new engines, has been about 161 per cent. of the gross recipts. If the cost of these is excluded, the result will show about 121 per cent. The nett recipts after deducting the amount of interest which has fallen due for the year show an earning upon the Whole cust of the road of \$20,59 per cent. and upon the capital stock of 46,60 per cent.

The entire amout of the assetts which have hansed into the 'I'reasurer's hands for the year, including those which he held at the close of the fiscal year 1862, has been \$1,745,082 41. How this amount has been disposed of, the various items in his statement of the annual expenditures will show. Among these will be found one for the sum of one hundred thousand dollars invested by the Board in the stock of a steamship company (the Merrimac.). The object of that Company was to rau the Steamship through the blockade with a view to the Importation on freight of those articles most needed by our people, and particularly by our manufacturing and railroad interests. The right of importation in this ship, in proportion to its stock, was stipulated for on behalf of the airy. Company. Unfortunately the Steamer was captured on her first voyage out and the lavestiment became + complete loss.

During the year the Company has made an investiment of some ninty thousand dollars in Cotton, which is stowed in sheds adjacent to the railroad It is covered by insurance. A portion of it has been shipped abroad, and these shipments will be continued as opportunity offers. The purchase was made during the last Spring, and its average cost per pound, with all expenses included is about 281 cents A sinking fund of \$65,000 in Confederate fif-teen million lean has been set aside, and this, with the investiment in Cotton, and farther isvostments of a portion of the means in the Treasury which it is contemplated to make, will, it is hoped, enable the company to meet any contingencies that may arise.

The amenat of interest coupons due but not presented is \$109,000.

The business done by the road has been hargely in excess of any previous year and the summing up would have been much larger but for t' e yellow fever which prevailed in the Fall of 1862.

The superintendent reports that the track is in good order. There has been considerable renewal of timber in the track, bridges and trestles, and it is designed during the present fiscal year to do much more. The iron on the road, as on all the leading roads in the Confederacy, is beginning to show considerable signs of lamination. It will be necessary; if possible, to obtain at least ten miles of new iron. To secure new rails the Government will have to give its aid. This, it is hoped it will do. It is designed also to remedy this trouble about rails to a certain extent during the present fiscal year, by renewing the ends of rails requiring it. This can be done in the company's shops and at a comparatively small cost, and it is hoped. that the iron can be kept in fair condition by the adoption of the above two courses. New wells and pumps are being put up along the entire line. Contracts have been w made for enlarging the freighting facilities at Wilmington and Kingsville. It is also designed to erect a new passenger house at Sumter, and a new warehouse at Mars Bluff. The fulfilment of contracts made for the epection of a wooden could over the Round House, for the protection of engines from the weather, Jus been unavoidably delayed, owing to the conscript act taking away certain men engaged on the contracts. The work, howevery, is progressing, and it is hoped this very needful improvement will soon be completed. Difficulties have been experienced from the failure of the rolling stock during the past year. These difficulties have, to a considerable extent, been removed by the purchase of two first-class freight engines, and the renting, on faverable terms, of nine locomotives and seventy-five freight cars. This will not only facilitate the business of the Road, but givean opportunity to repair throughly some of the engines belonging to the Company.

The school in the basement of the Methodist Control, taught by Yar kees, and attended by three hundred and fifty negro men, women, and children, was to be removed to the Baptist Church, which was repaired. There was no foundation for the report that Prof. F. M. Stevens was teaching the negro school at the Methodist Church. He had nothing to do with this dark institution of learning.

The Yankees were constructing a railr ad along Cherry to Jackson street, and the work was progressing rapidly. The negro draymen were loud in their e mplaint against the enterpise, saying that the Yankees were building the railload just to cheat them out of ther rights.

There was a general stagnation of business, and no encouragement given to any department of trade by those in authority. Some of the citizens seemed to take this as an indiaction that the Yaukces expected not to be able to hold the city long, though the fortifications were being strengthened and extended. The houses of Capt. James Cowan, Benj. Hardaway, and Mrs. Irvin, had becu torn down to give place to fortifications. The Yankees appeared to live and move in

From the Richmond Examilier. Recognition.

The last mail from Europe revives the fears of the North of recognition. The London' Post has an article on the subject of more than usual significance. It has the impressive heading of "What the North Must Expect.' The import of the article is, that unless by the begining of another year the relat ve positions of the North and South are materially changed, it is probable that the European powers will recognise the independence of the South as unfait accompli. That our readers may form their own idea of the import of the article, we give its most material points. In a long editorial on the subject, the London. Morning Post concludes in the following terms:

e o o Although the Earopean powers have hitherto observed a strict neautrality. and have declined to recognise the independence of the Southern Confederacy, the Federal Government must be well aware that any serious reverse sustained by their arms at the present juncture would leave neutral States no other choice than to acknowledge the new Republic. The attitude of France, or rather the exigencies of that kingdom 'in her Mexican celations, cannot but ren 'er the Government at Whashington apprehensive that at an early period, the long sought-for recognition will be accorded to the South. The fact that after a war of two years and a half, the Border, State of Virginia is still in the p s essen of the Confederates, and that the latter are enabled for the third time to roll back the tide of invasion, cannot be occolocked by nations who interpretthe term n-u rality as meaning something different from culpable indifference. The reselt of the present campaign will, in all probability, decide the issue of the war, and if, with the incoming year, we should see peace established between the two federations, the North will be not less indebted than the South to the happy chain of circumstances which will have enabled General Lee to strike a defensive blow The Paris correspondent of the New York Heral' mentions that this article of the Morning Post was copied by the Constitutionnel, he semi-official organ of the Emperor, and that it had "warmed the secessionists of Paris into great hope of the early recognition of the Confederate S.a.e ." The correspondent adds: The articles which have recently been published in the Morning Post, intimating a speedy recognition of the Southern Confederacy in certain contingencies, have raised the hopes of the rebels here amazingly. They assist that there were instances of an understanding between the English and French Governments, and that these articles are intended to prepare the way for the Emperor." Other correspondents in Europe allude to this article of the Morning Post as foreshadowing the early recognition of the Confederacy. and the Yankee papers are greatly exercised over it. We give no opinion in the matter. We have given the article as a piece of news, and leave our reade s to sift anything from it they can:



ADJ'T AND INSP'T GEN'S OFFICE, 1 RICHMONS, October 25, 1863. General Orders. ) No. 941.

I. The practice of relieving officers from commands to which they have been appointed and assigned, and ordering them to report in person to this office for further assignment, will cease unless specially required by orders from this office.

11. Soldiers returning home on furlough, or on reaching places at which they will stay.during furlough, will immediately report to the nearest enrolling officer, who will keep a register of their names, descriptive list, place where stationed, by whom the furlough was granted and the time at which it expires.

III. When at the expiration of his further and being at a distance from an Hospital Extentioning Board, a soldier is unable to travel, the enfolling officer will order him before the Board of Examiners for conscripts, and the medical officer and one of the physicians "employed" concurring, they will forward to his commanding General with a statement of his case, a recommendation for an extension of furlough not to exceed thirty days, duplicates being also sent to the Surgeon General. But when the soldier is accessible to a general hospital, he will be sent before the Hospital Examining Board, who will conform to the preceding instructions.

IV. In cases of sickness or wounds, which from any cause, are neglected, or do not receive proper treatment, the disability in consequence being prolonged, the soldier will be sent, by the enrolling officer, to the nearest camp of instruction for treat mont in hospital.

V. Recommendation for extension of leave to officers and furloughs to soldiers, and medical certificates to officers, and certificates of disability to soldiers, will only be given by authorized Boards soldiers, will only be given by authorized Boards of Examiners ; or, in cases embraced in the first section of corsgraph III, of the order by the Board of Examiners for conscripts, recemmen-dations or certificates from private physicans or from a medical officer singly, will not the secured. VI. Furloughed soldiers will not be permitted to go within the lines of the enemy.
