Treason in North Carolina.

There can no longer be a doudt that a cabal of traitors in North Carolino, instigated and led by the Raleigh Standard and Progress, are actively engaged in an effort to separate that State from the Confederacy, and to place it again at the feet of Yankee dominion. This design has been long believed by us, but the traitors engaged in it have from prudential considerations, sought to keep it concealed from public view that they might the more successfully'and insidiously corrupt the people of that gallant State and lay the foundation for their ultimate work. Concealment is new no longer, desired by them even were it longer possible. They now openly proclaim that they are for peace "on any terms," and a State convention is called to inaugurate peace measures. They boast that the people of North Carolina are with them in sentiment and purpose; and they flaunt their treasonable banners openly in theface of the country.

What this state of things will result in remains to be seen. These traitors ought to have been arrested and imprisoned long ago, and a stop put at once to their treasonable purposes and schemes. We fear the matter has gone too far now to be arrested except by harsher measures than it is the policy of our government to adopt. We hope the patriotism of the people of North Carolina is equal to the painful emergency, but we fear the result, as long as Holden and Pennington are permitted to mislead and corrupt public sentiment through the powerful agency of the Press - Lynchburg Republican.

HONOR TO THE PRIVATE SOLDIER .- It would be difficult to speak too highly of the deeds and self-devotion of our privates in the field. Yet, except a general acknowledment of this fact, threy have received but a small share of the honors of this war. Individual wallantry has been seldom noticed, and in very few instances has the name of a private been gazetted by the authorities, either military or

The generous Beauregard is an exception' to this remark. In his general orders, he has more than once held up the achievements of some gallant private to be admired and imitated by the army. One of his batteries has been named after a private who fell in the vicinity of Charleston. It is this considerate regard for the deserts of his soldiers, that helps to make him one of the most beloved generals of the Confederacy. Other generals would do well to follow his noble example in this respect.-Columbia Guardian.

master, &c., &c. II. Applicants for clerkships will be required to possess a fair knowledge of arithmetic, to write good English, and in a legible hand. For subor-dinate positions, less will be required. Ill. All applications must be supported by vouchers of unimpeachable character, and the sufficiency of witnesses thereunto, if in civil life, must be certified by some justice of the peace, or other county or municipal officer. Where testi-

monials are from the commanding officers of the

applicant, no such certificate will be necessary.

IV. It shall be the duty of the Chief Quartermaster of each State to keek a loster of such applicants, and to place their papers on file for refer ence; and he will report at the expiration of each quarter the number thereof, and the number of appointments, to the Qurtermaster General.

V. Local Quartermasters will (in case they have made no authorised arrangement for clerks or other employees) be expected to supply themselves, as far as practicable, from the class of "disabled soldiers" thus enrolled, who may be found competent to discharge the duties of the department. THE FOLLOWING ACT OF THE GENERAL assembly of North Carolina is published for the information of all concerned: AN ACT TO AMEND AN ACT IN RELATION TO THE MILE.

THE AND A GUARD FOR HOME DEFENCE. SEC. 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of North Carolina, and it is hereby en-acted by the authority of the some. That neither the Governor of this State, nor the officers acting under an act ratified on the 7th day of July, 1863 63, entitled "An act in relation to the Militia and a Guard for Home Defence," shall call out for drill or muster the persons enrolled under said act, oftener than once a month in company drill, or of-tener than twice a year in battalion drill, which battalion drills shall take the place of the company drills for the month in which they are appointed, unless when called into actual service to repel invasion or suppress insurrection, or to execute the laws of the State.

Sec. 2. Be it further enected. That the Governor shall have the power to use the Guards for Home Defence for the purpose of arresting conscripts and deserters; Provided, they shall not be ordered upon this duty beyond the limits of the connties in which they reside or the counties adjacent thereto.

Suc. 3. Be it further engeted, That in addition to the exemptions contained in the act to which this is an amendment, there shall be exempt county commissioners appointed under an act entitled An act for the relief of wives and families of seldiers in the army," regular millers, blacksmiths who have established shops, necessary operatives in factories and foundries, the Attorney General, Solicitors of the several circuits and counties, physicians of five years' practice, contractors with the State or Confederate government, one editor to each newspaper and the necessary compositors, mail carriers, professors in colleges and teachers in academies; Provided, that this exemption shall only apply to the drills specified in this bill and not to service when the Guard for Home Defence is call ed into the field.

SEC. 4. Be it further enacted, That for failure to attend at battalion or regimental drill each field officer shall forfeit and pay one hundred dollars, each Captain and other officers who shall fall to muster and drill their companies the times anpointed, shall forfeit and pay for each failure fifty dollars, and if a non-commissioned officer or private shall fail to attend at any drill, he shall forfeit and pay not less than five nor more than tweutv-five dollars; Provided, that every absentee shall be allowed until the next master to make his excuse. The fines shall be adjudged by regimental and company courts martial, and judgments are to be entered up and the fines collected in the same mode and in accordance with the provisions of the Military Law of North Carolina, passed at the second extra session of the General Assembly,

Sac. 5. Be further enacted, That the Surgeon General by and with the advice and consent of the Governor, may appoint surgical boards, not exceeding three, composed of two physicians each, who shall declare by their certificates those person who shall be exempt from service under the act to which this is an amendment, on account of mental or physical disability, and they shall receive the pay of their rank and traveling expenses to be determined by the Adjutant General. SEC. 6. Be it further enacted, That the Guard for home defence, should they be called into sorvice by the Governor, shall receive the same pay, rations and allowances as soldiers in the Confederate State service, and shall be subject to the rales and articles of war of the Confederate States.

See. 7. Be it further enasted, That when the pressure of public danger shall not prevent the observance of such a rule, the said Guard for homedefence shall not be called into service en masse, but by drafts of a number of men from each convenient company, so as to make up the aggregate force required. SEC. 8. Be it further enworld. That this act shall

The company drills required by the let see tion of the foregoing Act will take place on the second Saturday in the months of January, February, March, May, June, July, August, September, November and December, and the Battalion drills on the second Saturday in the menths of April and October.

II. The 2d section of the foregoing act is construed to mean that the parties enumerated are exempt from drills, apprehending deserters, and other ordinary duty of the Guard for home defence, but are not exempt from duty when the Guard for home defence is called into service to repel invasion, suppress insurrection or to execute the laws of the State: By order of Governor Vance :

Richmond, March 24, 1863. Circular Order. The attention of officers baving charge of con-

scripts, is directed to section 2 of the act of Con-

ess, approved October 2d, 1862, which is as follows Sec. 2. That if any person who has been or is about to be enrolled for service in the army, shall, at any time before being ass gned to any company, declare to the enrolling or commanding officer that he prefers being enrolled for service in the navy or the marine corps, it shall be the duty of the said officer to enroll such person for the service which he may prefer, and to transmit to the Secretary of

the Navy a list of the persons so enrolled. The Superintendent directs that this provisoin of the law be observed, and that reports be made accordingly. Whenever any officer of the Navy, designated

by the Navy Department, shall present himself for the purpose, any officer in charge of conscripts will eause them to be mustered in presence of such officer of the navy, in order that they may be offered the alternative of entering the naval service.
