### CONGRESSIONAL.

RICHMOND, Dec. 18. Nothing of interest in the Senate in open session. In the House Mr. Turner's resolutions and Mr. Barksdale's substitute were taken up.

Mr. McMullen offered another substitute declaring that whilst it is neither expedient or compatible with the dignity of the Confederate States to send Commissioners to Washington to secure a cessation of hostilities, yet it would be eminently proper that the House of Representatives should dis patch, without delay, to some convenient point, a body of commissioners, to confer with such individuals as may be appointed by the Government of the United States to agree, if possible, upon terms for a lasting and honorable peace, subject to the ratification of the respective Governments and the sovereign States respectively represented.

Mr. McMulen addressed the House in explanation of his views, but before concluding, the morning hour expired, and the House resumed the consideration of the currency bill.

Mr. Foote occupied the floor till the hoar of adjournment.

RICHMOND, Dec. 17. The Senaje passed the House bill increasing the pay and milag, of members of Congress, also the Senate bill regulating the compensation of postmasters, special agents, and also the bill to increase the pay of the marine corps. The Senate then resolved itself into secret session.

In the House the peace resolutions were referred to the Committies on Foreign Affairs. The confiscation and currency bills were further debated.

### LATER FROM THE NORTH. NORTHORN ACCOUNTS FROM GEOR.

RICHMOND, Dec. 18. Northern papers of Thursday were re ceived last night.

Official dispatches from Hilton Head, of the 12th says, that Gen. Howard, command ing the right wing of Sherman's a my, had communicated with Foster, his chief of scouts having descended the Ogeechee in a small boat and thus made his way to our (Yankee) lines. He left the army on the Oth Inst.

A dispatch from Gen. Howard says, we have met with perfect success thus far. Our troops are in the spirits.

Nothing of importance had occurred at Nashville up to the 13th. Geu. Lyon was moving on Russelville.

YANKEE CONGRESS. In the Senate, on the 14th, Mr. Chandler offered a series of resolutions denouncing the release of the St. Albans raiders, and authorizing the organization of an army corps for the protection of the porthern frontier from the incursions of Rebel raiding

Mr. Chandler also introduced a series of resolutions directing the Secretary of State to demand from the British Government payment in full for all the American vessels destroyed by piratica, ships from English ports. The resolutions were laid over.

In the House the Senate bill authorizing the purchase of six revenue cutters for the lakes passed.

In committee of the whole Mr. Brooks made a long speech in favor of negotiations

THE CANADIAN FRONTIER.

Gen. Dix has issued orders, in conseovence of the release and discharge of the St. Albans raiders, directing the military commander on the frontier, in the event of a similar raid, to pursue the maranders, if necessary imo Canada, and, if arrested there, they ard under no circumstances to be sur-

A Montreal telegram of the 14th says, the St. Albans raiders left the city immediately after they were discharged. The authori-

ties are taking step's to arrest them.

A Torento telegram of the 13th says, the Lake Erie raiders were again before the court to-day, but were discharged on the ground that the court had no jurisdiction. The result created much excitement.

Butter has accompanied the troops.

Gen. Crittenden and staff have resigned. Their resignation has been accepted. The Atterney General of Canada was of the opinion that the decision in the case of the St. Albans raiders was wrong, and ordered the re-arrest of the parties.

Private dispatches from Montreal say there is a perfect penie in Canada among the railroad managers, in anticipation of nonintercourse with the United States, which is expected, unless the Government takes prompt action to allay the excitement on the border.

A Washington telegram says, the demand. of the Brazilian Government for reparation for the seizure of the Florida has been reocived and is decidedly important. Seward has sent a reply, and without endcayoring to justify the capture, indicates a desire to have the matter properly adjusted according to international law.

### A BATTLE IN TENNESSEE.

YANKEE ACCOUNT.

RICHMOND, Dec. 19.

Northern papers of the 16th received. A Nashville telegram of the 15th says, our lines advanced and engaged the rebels this morning. The left occupies the same ground als in the morning.

The right advanced five miles, driving the enemy from the river and from his entrenchments, and forced back his right and centre.

Thomas' official dispatch says, "I attack ed the enemy's left and centre this morning and drove him from the river below the city, very nearly to Franklin, a distance of about eight miles. I have captured Gen. Chalmers' headquarters and train, between eight hundred and a thousand prisoners, with sixteen pieces of artillery. A shall attack the enemy again to-morrow.

### LATER FROM TENNESSEE.

RECHMOND, Dec. 19. Gen. Thomas, in an official dispatch dated the 16th, p. m. claims that the enemy has been pressed at all points in his line of retreat to Brintwood Hill. He also claims the capture of a large number of prisoners and several pieces of artillery, and says, he has ordered the pursuit to be continued at

daylight. The woods and field entrenchments are filled with the enemy's small arms, abandoned in their retreat.

The Federal loss does not exceed three hundred, with very few killed.

The news caused great rejoicing in Yan-Gold declined on the 15th. The price at I o'clock was 227.

General Sherman's Guide. A Yankee newspaper has the follow-

General Sherman has with him in his Georgia campaign one of the best and most reliable scouts or guides in the Southwest-an old man, a native Georgian, and a wealthy planter and slave holder at that. It would not be proper, of course, to mention his name, but he is well known to all who were in the habit of visiting headquarters a year ago. When the war broke out he denonneed the Southern leaders, and in consequence of his Union septiments, was compelled to leave his home near Macon, between two days, His neighbors missed him, and suspecting, rightly, that he had gone off to join the Yankees, they followed him so closely that he was obliged to hide in the mountains in the Northern part of his State for several weeks.

They have since organized all kinds of raids for no other purpose than to catch this one man. After being in the service some time, he volunteered his services to General Buell, but that officer, didn't need much Southern " guidance." Next be received a position. as volunteer aid to Gen. Rozecrans; to whom he was of great service in the great campaign terminating at Chatta-nooga. He has been with Gen. Sherman since last June. There is not a highway or byway in the interior of Georgia with which he is unacquainted; and scarcely a town or village in which he is not known.

CTOLEN FROM MY STABLES AT SPRING D Hill, Lenoir County, N. "No officer, or agent, shall impress the necessary supplies which any person reay have for the consumption of himself, his family, employees, slaves, or to carry on his ordinary mechanical, manufacturing or a ricultural employments."
