## The Cost of Making Butter.

In a recent report, published by the Iowa State Diary Commissioner, the average cost of producing one pound of butter is given as follows:

In the creamery that makes 40,-000 pounds of butter per year, it costs 4 cents to make one pound of butter, and in a creamery prducing 50,000 pounds, it costs 3.4 cents to make one pound; while in creameries making 150,000 pounds per year, it costs 1.85 cents. In some of the very large central plants, that are producing over 200,000 pounds of butter per year, it costs 1.4 cents ney remedies, and was treated by per pound.
