ed by Exploding Boiler. The sad and shocking news that Mr. Theo. O. Pomeroy had been killed about 6 o'clock by a boiler explosion at his saw mill near Creedmoor was received here early Saturday morning and his brother, Mr. Jas. V. Pomeroy, left on the 8:15 a. m. train for the

Mr. Pomeroy lived at Creedmoor and was operating a saw mill near there when the fatal explosion occurred. The boiler had been fired and later cold water was turned in is the theory of the accident.
