FARMERS' AND WOMEN'S INSTITUTES.

For genuine uplift and substantial progress nothing is being done that contributes more to that end than the education of the rural population, especially that branch of education which is teaching better agricultural methods, for as progress is made in agriculture—the real basis of prosperity—progress in other lines will follow as naturally and certainly as day follows night.

So much by way of calling attention to the Farmers' and Women's Institutes which the State will hold in this County this month—Eton College, Saturday 17th; Friendship, Monday 19th; Mebane, Tuesday 20th.

The editors had a delightful and profitable meeting at Morehead City last week, judging from the accounts they give out in their papers.

Well, no class enjoys a respite more than the newspaper men. Among the officers elected for the ensuing year are Mr. Jas. H. Cain of Asheville, president; Mr. John B. Sherrill of Concord, secretary for the 25th time. It was decided to hold the next Summer meeting at Asheville and a mid-Winter meeting at Salisbury. Both places asked for the next meeting and both invitations were accepted.

Wall Street, while never having been accused of being a fervidly moral institution in any sense, is a pretty fair political barometer. It is betting 3 to 2 that Wilson beats Taft. In New York bets are offered that Wilson will receive two-thirds majority in the electoral-college with no takers.

Judge Walter Clark opened his Senatorial campaign in Greensboro Tuesday night. While Gov. Kitchin takes Senator Simmons for his target, Judge Clark shoots at both Simmons and Kitchin. The latter will now have to put on defensive armor.

Ertwhire Republicans, now converts to T. R.'s progressive party, are in Greensboro today to organize and formulate plans to help along a forlorn hope.

The "Bull Moose" convention will meet in Chicago next Monday. At the regular convention in June Col. T. R. saw assembled a greater aggregation of his supporters than he will ever look upon again.

Developments of the past day or so show police officials in New York City to be pastmaster grafters.

Judge E. B. Dillon declines the Republican nomination for Governor of Ohio on account of the factional division in his party.

Mistaking the use of firearms in a lodge initiation as an attack on himself, Furman Bagwell, aged 31, a candidate being initiated into the Woodmen of the World at Honesdale, S. C., suddenly rushed from the room, snatched up his pistol and hurrying back began shooting. Three shots took effect in Mattan Taylor, aged 26, who is not expected to live. The young men were fast friends.

Rev. Jas. B. Reid, a Baptist minister, died last week at his home at Collettsville, Caldwell county. He was 36 years old and is survived by a wife and five children.

One negro was killed and two badly hurt in Winston Tuesday last week, when a bucket on a pulley went too high and pulled out part of a brick wall of a 50-foot smokestack.

Greensboro last week voted \$130,000 in bonds for street improvements, sewerage extension, market and opera house improvements. The proposition carried by a good majority.

A runaway horse and a negro collided head-on in Durham last week and knocked each other down. Both recovered after a time and neither had sustained serious injury.

Texas Democratic primary was held Saturday. The returns indicate that Gov. Colquitt has been re-nominated and that Congressman Shepherd will be named for Senator to succeed Bailey.

Democratic Tariff Declarations For 36 Years.

New York Herald.

1876—We demand that all customs house taxation shall be only for revenue.

1880—A tariff for revenue only.

1884—But in making reduction in taxes it is not proposed to injure any domestic industries, but rather to promote their healthy growth. We therefore denounce the abuses of the existing tariff, and, subject to the preceding limitations, we demand that Federal taxation shall be exclusively for public purposes and shall not exceed the needs of the government economically administered.

1888—This convention hereby indorses and recommends the early passage of the bill for the reduction of the revenue now pending in the House of Representatives (the Mills bill).

1892—We denounce Republican protection as a fraud and robbery of the great majority of the American people for the benefit of the few.

1896—We hold that tariff duties should be levied for purposes of revenue. Taxation should be limited by the needs of the government, honestly and economically administered.

1900—Tariff laws should be amended by putting the products of trusts upon the free list to prevent monopoly under the plea of protection. We denounce the Dingley tariff law as a trust-breeding measure.

1904—We denounce protection as a robbery of the many to enrich the few, and favor a tariff limited to the needs of the government.

1908—Immediate reduction of import duties. Trust-controlled products on the free list. Restore the tariff to a revenue basis. Wood pulp, print paper, lumber, timber and logs upon the free list.

1912—We declare it to be a fundamental principle of the Democratic party that the Federal government, under the constitution, has no right or power to impose or collect tariff duties except for the purposes of revenue, and we demand that the collection of such taxes shall be limited to the necessities of the government, honestly and economically administered.

Standing of North Carolina Banks.

The corporation commission has worked out the standing of the banks in the State and has prepared a statement which shows real health.

There are 377 banks in North Carolina now, an average of nearly four to the county. They have a combined wealth of \$71,144,154.23. The statement for June, 1911, was considered good, but the showing this year is more than eight millions above that. From all sources last year, the millions invested in banks amounted to \$63,910,703.32. In cash items, gold coin, silver and all minor currency, trust deposits and miscellanies, there was a decrease. This amounted to \$194,439.99. Subtracted from the greater amount there were fund credits amounting to \$8,124,883.90.

Remarkable Longevity.

Elizabeth City, July 24.—One of the most remarkable cases of longevity in eastern North Carolina is Mrs. Elizabeth Rhodes, of Tyrrell county. She is reputed to be 105 years old and there is no doubt about her being over one hundred years at this rate.

Design for Home Monument to Women.

Raleigh Dispatch, 24th.

The design for the monument to North Carolina Women of the Confederacy, to be given by Col. Ashley Horne to the State, was selected this afternoon. It is the design showing the figure of a Southern woman and Southern youth as central figures. The other design offered was that of a Southern woman with a Southern maiden beside her, both designs being by Augustus Lukeman, selected some time ago as the sculptor for the monument.

The idealized Southern woman and grandson are to be posed on massive granite base on either side of which will be in bas relief figures illustrating the going forth of the Southern men to war with the blessings of the heroic women, and the return of the war-worn remnant to wasted homes and heart-broken wives and daughters.

There will be a paved square extending from the rear of the monument to the curb about 15 feet, the paved curb being about 30 feet long. Seats will be arranged at either end. There will be a private hedge at the back and two sides.

The monument will have a place in Capitol square facing the main entrance to the new State building for the erection of which Colonel Horne is chairman of the building commission.

It is expected that the monument will be in place within a year.

Judge Newman, of the United States court, rendered a decision in Atlanta last week restraining the State of Georgia from subjecting the property of the Georgia railroad, leased by the two systems, to an ad valorem tax. The court held that the ad valorem tax could only be applied to the property of the Atlanta Terminal Company and not to the remainder of the Georgia railroad property. The latter, the court ruled, comes under the original Georgia railroad charter exemption, in spite of the fact that it is controlled by the lessees. By the decision the State loses the tax income on property valued at \$3,500,000.
