Conducted by U. S. Department of Agriculture, State Department of Agriculture and A. & M. College. I. O. Schaub is in charge of Boys' Corn Clubs in North Carolina, and A. K. Robertson is Assistant in Club Work. Prizes awarded on the basis of largest yield at least cost per bushel, yield counting 50 points and cost 50 points. First prize in State. Free trip to Washington, D. C., offered by Farmers Union. Fifty dollars, offered by Hastings Seed Company, Atlanta, Ga. Won by Geo. West, Jr., Kinston, N. C., 1847 bushels, cost 18c per bu.

Seventh prize, Albert Davis, Millboro, 81.4 bu., cost 37c per bu. Summary of Corn Club Work. Although a large part of the State experienced the most severe drought in many years, the result of the Boys' Contest shows an increased average yield above 1911. Six hundred and thirty-five boys have made their report with a total yield of 39,800 bushels, or an average yield of 62.8 bushels per acre. In 1911 435 boys reported with an average yield of 60.7 bushels. The average cost in 1912 was 47c, while in 1911 it was 45c. This increased cost is due largely to the severe drought in the Piedmont section, which reduced the yield and thereby increased the cost per bushel. Two boys made above 175 bushels, five above 150, twenty-one above 125 and seventy-five above 100. The largest yield was made by Richard Brock, in Wayne county, but his cost of production was so large that the championship of the State goes to George West, Jr., of Kinston, with a yield of 184 bushels. The two boys making the best record in each district, twenty in all, win free trips to the National Corn Exposition. These trips are given by the Southern Fertilizer Association of Atlanta, Ga. Many counties will also send boys to this Exposition. One girl, Miss Ethel Smith, of Stanly county, competed with the boys and won third prize in her district. There were two other girls in the contest in the State, but their yields were not large enough to win district prizes. The work is in charge of I. O. Schaub, of the U. S. Department of Agriculture and A. & M. College, assisted by A. K. Robertson, of the State Department of Agriculture.

Sunday a week the management of the North Carolina Soldiers' Home provided the one hundred and more Confederate veterans in the home a dinner that consisted of pork-ham, soue-meat, Irish potatoes, rice, baker's bread, biscuit, cornbread, coffee, tea and milk and peaches. A few hours thereafter 49 of the veterans were in the throes of attacks bordering on ptomaine poison. The physician of the home and several trained nurses called in were kept busy for several hours before the old soldiers were fully relieved. The pork-ham and soue, especially the latter, are blamed for the attacks.

Frank Guthrie, an aged white man and blind, was sentenced to eight months on the Buncombe county roads for conducting a "blind tiger." He appealed to the Supreme Court and gave \$4,000 bond. It is stated that when the automobile license law was passed in 1909 there were about 1,000 automobiles in the State. The number has increased to 6,000 in three years and the license law yields a revenue of \$15,000 per year. Col. E. F. McRae, a prominent citizen, was found dead in bed at his home in Maxton Wednesday morning last week. He was 68 years old and unmarried. He had been a member of the Legislature and resident of the State Fair Association. Senator Overman has introduced a resolution in the Senate providing for a pension of \$1,200 for Stanley Mitchell, of Asheville. Young Mitchell entered the Naval Academy in 1907 and in 1912 it was discovered that he had developed tuberculosis and was discharged from the navy. Senator Overman's resolution would retire the young man with pay. A. H. Boyden, of Salisbury, is mentioned as a candidate for collector of this district, the others being A. D. Watts, of Statesville, G. E. Webb, of Winston, and W. C. Newland, of Lenoir. Legislation designed to accomplish the rehabilitation of the American merchant marine will be sought from Congress by the Southern Panama Canal Conference, which was formally organized in Atlanta Wednesday week. Objection was offered to the form of the resolution on the ground that it advocated a subsidy, but it was passed.

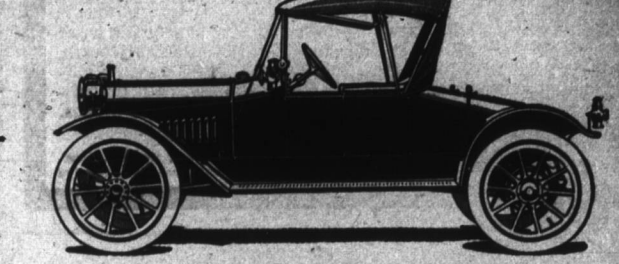
