An anti-alien land ownership bill designed primarily to prevent Japanese from acquiring title to real property within the State of California, but so worded as to prohibit any alien from owning land more than one year except upon his declaration of his intention to become a citizen has passed the lower house of the California Legislature by a vote of 50 to 16.

Final appraisal of the estate of John Jacob Astor who went to his death on the Titanic, fixes the value at \$87,216,691. This is approximately \$10,000,000 more than the tentative appraisals and the assessed valuation indicated the estate to be worth.

Postmaster General Burleson has informed Representative Dillon of South Dakota that he does not recognize any obligation to observe the results of the preferential primaries in the selection of postmasters under the South Dakota primary law.

Selection of saloon keepers by popular vote became a reality in Elk Point a town in Union county, S. D., last week. It is believed to be the first time in the country that the ballot has been utilized to determine who shall operate saloons.

The committee which visited Guilford and Mecklenburg counties this week to see the methods of macadam road repair employed in the counties have not decided what they will recommend in their report to the county commissioners.
