**Cour.**  
October Term of the Superior Court convened Monday morning with Judge W. A. Devin presiding. It is a two weeks term for the trial of civil cases only.

First were taken up eleven divorce cases and disposed of. In five of them plaintiffs took non-suit, and was continued, the jury delivered adversely to the plaintiffs in one, and divorces were granted in the following: Ed. Rogers vs. Addie Rogers, Robt. Bethel vs. Lina C. Bethel, Bob Miller vs. Fannie Miller, and Barbara Perry vs. Charles Perry.

Next was taken up, on Monday afternoon, the case of A. H. Moser et al. vs. The City of Burlington. This is a suit against the City on account of alleged damages caused by its sewerage and disposal plant, and the trial is not over yet. This afternoon the lawyers will begin addressing the jury. Twice before has this case been tried, and the case has been over in the Supreme Court. At this term more than fifty witnesses have been in attendance. The plaintiffs are represented by Mess. Long & Long of Greensboro, and the defendants by Mess. Parker & Parker of Graham, W. H. Carroll, E. S. W. Dameron, and J. E. Vernon of Burlington, and Judge W. P. Bynum of Greensboro. By the strong and able array of legal talent every inch of the ground has been strenuously contested.

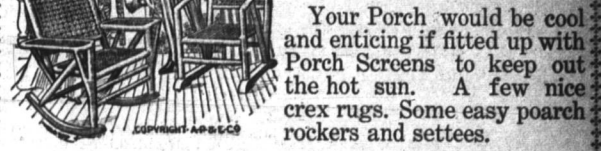
