## **Delinquent Tax-Payers.**

All 1914 and prior taxes which are not paid to me before noor Monday the 5th day of July, 1915, will positively be advertised and the property to cover sold.

The law allows no further indulgence to Delinquents.

I am an officer sworn to obey the law. I have no other recourse than to advertise and sell. I shall, therefore, be unable to evade the unpleasant duty of levying on the property or garnisheeing the wages of each and every delinquent who does not settle at once the amount of his delinquency.

I can make not one exception-it will be useless to ask further time-it is beyond my power and legal right to extend it.

Those who have not settled with me by July 10th can only blame themselves, and I solemnly warn these, here and finally, that if they do not at once respond to this notice, the steps required by law will, without further warning, be regretfully but unhesitatingly taken.

It can not be expected that I shall personally call on every lelinquent, and I shall not attempt to do so.

It is your duty to settle for your taxes at my office, and unless you do so before noon on Monday the 5th day of July, I regret to advise that the unpleasant and expensive method of enforcing collection by law must be employed against you. Respectfully,
