Cor. of The Gleaner. Chapel Hill, N. C., July 5.—The Extension Bureau of the University has just issued a new 30 page bulletin which discusses fully Country Life Institutes, and gives helpful working programs.

This bulletin makes it possible for any community to hold its Country Life Institute; that is, wherever there is alert leadership and sufficient fellowship. The suggestion came to the University in the spring from Rev. T. S. Coble of Mocksville.

Chapel Hill will hold its own country life institute this week. In this it follows closely the plans laid down in the bulletin. Some of the best religious and social workers in the State have been secured to appear on the program, as well as experts in country life work and activities.

Chapel Hill's celebration of the Fourth of July is a noteworthy contribution to North Carolina State history. 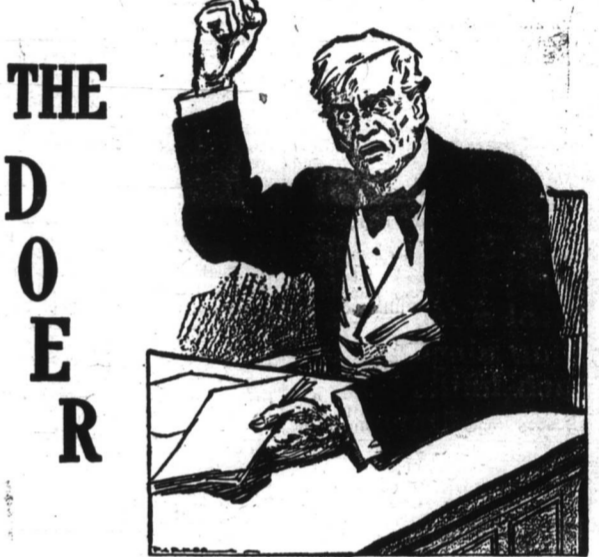
