

SENATORS WORK OVERTIME TO CLEAN UP MUCH WORK. GOOD BUILDING FOR PIGEONS

It Costs From \$1.25 to \$1.75 Per Pair for Construction of Pen, Including Fittings. A gable roof building 10 to 15 feet

wide, 6 feet from the floor to the eaves, and 8 to 9 feet to the ridge makes a good pigeon house. A pen 8 by 9 feet will accommodate 25 pairs of pigeons, while 40 pairs may be kept in a pen 8 by 13 feet. The necessary floor space to allow per pair varies from 2½ to 3 square feet, according to the size of the pen, as a pair of birds requires less floor space in large than in small pens From 20 to 75 pairs of pigeons may be kept to advantage in each pen. It costs from \$1.25 to \$1.75 a pair to construct pigeon houses, including interior fit tings and a small outside pen or fly-

Fittings should be as simple as po sible and easy to clean. Two nest boxes should be provided for each pair of pigeons, and there should be som extra nests. The nest boxes are usually about 12 inches square, yet some breeders prefer this width and height

with a depth of 15 to 18 inches.
