Commissioner Young expressed him-

self as highly gratified at the assur-ances of support given him and stated that he considered the action of the federation a step in the right direction and one which is sure to bring splendid results to the citizens and property owners of North Carolina.

Eight thousand persons are rendered home-less and nine persons are burned to leath every day in the year in the

GERMAN SPIES SHIPPED HIGH POWER WIRELESS OUTFITS TO MEXICO.

MAIL WAS SENT TO GERMANY

PROHIBITION TAX IS NOW

Committee Measure Would Prevent Manufacture During Period of War Washington—Prohibition legislation was approved by the senate finance committee as a new feature of the war tax bill

Prohibitive taxes upon distillation of whiskey and other spirits for bever-age purposes, with a ban upon their importation, were agreed upon by a substantial majority of the committee Taxes fixed by the house on beer and wines were left unchanged though they have not yet been finally approved. General suspension of beverage pro duction by distilleries and use of liquor now in bonded warehouses prob-ably would be the effect of the new tax section if enacted into law.


