MORE THAN HALF MILLION MEN HAVE VOLUNTEEERED

Between 700.000 and 800.000 Men Are

Now Enrolled. Washington.—More than half a mfl-lion men have volunteered in the American army and navy during the period of less than three months that has elapsed since war was declared to exist.

The army, navy and national guard represented an aggregate strength of little more than 300,000 men when the war resolution was adopted. Today between 700,000 and 800,000 are enrolled in the various branches of the fighting services and the great majorign of them are armed. equipped and under training. They will be joined at the end of the summer by nearly a million men selected for the new ma-tional army from the millions registered for war duty June 5.

The regular army totalled a little more than 100,000 men three months ago; it is nearing the 250,000 mark today and war officials, backed by the press of the country, are bending every effort to bring it up to 300,000 during

The National Guard, 150,000 strong when war came, numbers nearly 260,-000 today, according to the best esti-mates available. Of that number nearly 75,000 actually are under arms, guarding against German plotters and doing the job in a thoroughly and sol-
