experiment stations report no loss of grain when the tops are cut, but when tops are cut and the leaves stripped from the remainder of the stalk, there is a less of grain. The average of the tests conducted in many southern states show that a loss of at least two bushels of grain per acre is had when leaves alone are stripped from the plant.

Aside from the decrease in yield of grain, pulling fodder is a costly method of securing roughage for livestock. The food valde of corn fodder is not as high as that of good legume hay and more abundant yields of the hay may be secured when proper steps are taken to provide it.

Mr. Holman states that the first to take advantage of the new allotment. They placed an order for 16,000 pounds through county agent W. H. Robbins and the material will be shipped to Burgaw for distribution. This shipment was financed by the county Board of Commissioners so that land owners could have a supply to blow out stumps and otherwise improve the condition of their

"While we were allotted only 900,000 pounds last year, we actually got a little over one million pounds," says Mr. Holman. 'This material was used for removing rocks and stumps from fields, for ditching and for squaring up poorly shaped fields. The use of explosives for land clearing purposes results in larger fields, more economical use of labor and power machinery greater acre yields and increased returns per farm worker.
