They tell us that it begun Friday night and snowed all day Saturday. Saturday night and Sunday. It came after the manner of the snow of last week a regular storm of long duration. a regular storm of long duration. It reached a depth of 4 to 6 feet and drifted in places twice that depth. For three or four Saturdays afterward there were falls of snow, but

these were light, comparatively.

It was in the days of high rail images and there were lanes that inclosed the roads. It filled these lanes full to a depth of 5 to 6 feet of more and rendered them impassable. Then, think of the face of the earth being covered to that depth for a span of some four weeks. This must have entailed much suffering among man, beast and fowl.
