Portrait of L. Banks Holt to be Unveiled.

On Tuesday morning, March 29th, at 9 o'clock, an oil portrait of the late L. Banks Holt will be unveiled at the Graham Graded School. It is presented by his living daughters, Mrs. George A. Mebane of Greensboro, Mrs. J. K. Mebane of Washington City, Mrs. John C. Drewery of Raleigh and Mrs. Victor Graves of New York City.

The presentation and principal address will be made by Mr. L. Banks Mebane, a grandson of Mr. Holt and prominent lawyer of Greensboro. In addition to the address there will be other interesting and appropriate exercises.

The young granddaughter, Miss Mary Louise Graves, of Mr. Holt, will unveil the portrait. The portrait will hang in the school library for which the first substantial gift was made by Mr. Holt and which bears the name of the "L. Banks Holt Library," and it is fitting and proper that his portrait should adorn its walls.

The credit of securing this valuable and appropriate gift is due to the activities of Graham Public School Parent-Teacher Association in library extension work.

John Wagoner of Boon Station Dead.

On Wednesday morning, after a prolonged illness, John Wagoner, one of the leading and most esteemed citizens of Boon Station Township, died at his home one and a half miles south of Elon College, aged 90 years, 5 mos. and 3 days. He was twice married, the wives being sisters. He is survived by his widow and the following children: Mrs. D. Z. Whitesell, by his first wife, of Missouri, Billy Wagoner and Mrs. L. C. Chrismon of Burlington, James F. and Thurman of Elon College, J. Peter of Louisians, and Mrs. T. O. Sharpe of Durham. One brother Jacob Wagoner of Gibsonville, survives.

Mr. Wagoner was a life-long member of Frieden's Lutheran Church, where the burial will take place Friday afternoon.

During his long life Mr. Wagoner took great interest in the affairs of the county. He was a member of the Board of County Commissioners for several years.

Mr. Alfred T. Webster Dead.

After an illness of several weeks Mr. Alfred T. Webster died at the home of his son, Jerry A. Webster, in Burlington, last Saturday afternoon, aged 66 years. He had made his home in Graham for 30 years or more. He is survived by two daughters and six sons: Mrs. W. S. Wrenn and Mrs. T. L. Watkins of Greensboro, A. R. Webster of Richmond, Jerry A., Arthur L. of Burlington, Ernest P. and Walter of Graham and John of Haw River, and the following brothers and sisters: Mrs. R. E. Tate of Mebane, Mrs. Bert Holt of Burlington, Mrs. T. L. Trogden of Rameur, Miss Ada Webster of Bethel Falls, Chas. Webster of Belmont, Tow Webster of Central Falls and Mrs. W. W. Garrett of Graham.

The funeral services were conducted from the Presbyterian church at 2 o'clock Monday afternoon by Rev. W. E. Harrop. The pall bearers were Capt. E. G. Foster, Sam T. Johnston, John M. Crawford, W. J. Nicks, A. Holt and Lacy B. Bradshaw. The interment was in Linwood cemetery.
