#### ANOTHER NON-STOP FLIGHT.

Clarence D. Chamberlain and his backer, Chas. A. Levine, hopped off from Mineola, N. Y., Saturday morning at 6:05 in a Bellanca plane for a non-stop flight to Europe. Berlin was their objective. For lack of gas they were forced to land 70 miles southeast of Berlin. In this nonstop flight they covered over 3900 miles, besting Capt. Lindbergh's record flight by some 300 miles.

Capt. Lindbergh is a great big safety of Chamberlain's long flight. He said, "Chamberlain deserves great credit for his admirable flight. I have sent him my personal congratulations. were all good." He is not jeal-


