Dennis G. Brummit of Oxford, Attorney General, was on Tuesday night chosen as chairman of the State Democratic committee to succeed John G. Dawson of Kinston, resigned.

Aaron Sapiro has abandoned his million dollar damage suit against Henry Ford. Ford has apologized to the Jews and discontinued his paper's attacks on them and given Sapiro "substantial" satisfaction.

King Ferdinand of Roumania died Wednesday. It was his wife, Queen Marie, who toured this country last fall. His young grand-son, Michael, 6 years old, son of Prince Carol who renounced, succeeds to the throne. A regency will take charge and rule the country till the lad is 18 years old.

Wednesday was made a notable day in North Carolina, the occasion of the opening of the mile and half concrete bridge spanning the Chowan river. Up to this time the half dozen northeastern counties had been physically separated from the rest of the state. This feat of engineering has brought the "lost colonies" into the state's fold. Gov. McLean, from his vacation quarters in Wisconsin, sent back an inspiring message which was delivered by Lieut.-Gov. J. Elmer Long.

Col. Alston D. Watts, an unique figure in North Carolina politics for 30 years or more, died in Statesville, in the county of his birth, last Friday, aged 61 years. At one time he was U. S. deputy collector of internal revenue for the Western district. The last office he held was State Commissioner of Revenue. He served in both houses of the State legislature, and was one time secretary to Congressman John S. Henderson and Senator Simmons. He was a politician by instinct and devoted his talents to the success of the Democratic party. He was a political wizard. The Republicans feared him and the Democrats obeyed him. He is reputed to have known more political figures and facts than any man of his day and State. A remarkable man he was in leadership and organization.

Murphy Williams of Greensboro will speak and the Greeson quartette will sing. A large crowd is expected for the exercises. Dinner will be served on the church lawn.

The course in Christian Endeavor work being given by Rev. C. H. Morrison will close with the examinations on Friday, July 15th. Certificates will be awarded to those who make proper grades.

Dr. and Mrs. W. T. Whitsett attended the Simpson family gathering at Bethlehem Church north of Elon College on Thursday where several hundred members

of the family gathered to recount the story of the past history of the family and enjoy a very elaborate dinner. Next week Dr. Whitsett is to deliver the address before the Central District Lutheran picnic representing several counties which is to be held on the country club grounds in Salisbury. Several thousand are expected to be present from Rowan, Cabarrus, Davidson and other adjoining counties. A band concert, community singing, athletic contests, &c., will be a part of the day's programme. This is the third year this gathering has been held under the auspices of the Lutheran Brotherhood of the State.

The Greensboro district of the A. M. E. Church, colored, will hold a Sunday School convention for the district at Clapp's Chapel near here beginning July 27th and continuing three days.

Among those from here who attended the celebration at Alamance Church last Sunday were Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Summers, Miss Charlie Tysor, and Rev. C. N. Morrison.

Edward Ingle of South Boston, Va., was a visitor here this week. Miss Willie Brewer Meyers who has been visiting here for some weeks returned to her home in Winston-Salem on Wednesday.

Program Takes Shape

For Farm Meeting

Raleigh, N. C., July 20.—Everything is in readiness for the State Farmers' Convention which meets at State College July 26-27-28.

The convention will open officially Tuesday morning at eleven o'clock with the general address from Charles F. Cates of Mebane, President of the Convention, and Mrs. J. S. Turner of Reidsville, President of the State Federation of Home Demonstration Clubs. Dr. E. C. Brooks, President of State College, will deliver the address of welcome to the visiting farmers and their wives.

According to James M. Gray, secretary of the convention, the college will open its dormitories on Monday evening, July 25, so as to accommodate early arrivals. Supper will also be provided for those who arrive that afternoon. Registration will begin early Tuesday morning.

The convention this year will feature farm organizations in all of its various aspects. An official of the National Grange has been invited to deliver an address at one of the general meetings and the State Farmers' Alliance will also be represented. Local farm clubs, selling organizations, community clubs and both small and large cooperative associations will be represented.

Railroads have provided reduced rates for those who travel by rail. Certificates must be obtained from the secretary of the convention. The college will provide rooms as long as they last and meals may be obtained at a nominal cost of 25 cents each in the college dining hall and every arrangement will be made for the comfort of the visiting delegates.

More than usual care has been given to the exhibits this year and these along with the lectures at the sectional meetings will provide the special information wanted by many of the visitors. There will be a hog-calling contest, a horse shoe pitching tournament and a crop identification contest. This latter feature is a new addition to the convention this year and will be of great interest to both men and women.

Schedule "B" Tax Penalties.

Deputy Commissioner C. B. Bogart gives notice that a 30 percent penalty will be added to all taxes under schedule "B" for 1927-'28, if not paid by August 1st.
