COUNTY AFFAIRS.

A Board of County Commissioners has plenty of problems to grapple with that require good judgment and a degree of firmness.

At the last meeting of the Board, on the first Monday, five road items were presented for consideration, asking for repairs, for new roads and the like. All of them more or less important—some of them of general and some of special importance. All roads are of special importance to somebody, in that the rural population must have a way to get in and out, to market produce, attend to business, go to school and church and perform certain social duties. If the rural dweller is completely isolated, then he pays his tax in vain.

Six complaints were lodged in regard to valuations for tax purposes. Of course all want lower valuations for tax saving purposes. It might have been different if the property were being offered for sale.

A motion was made and passed to borrow \$100,000, but for what purpose the records did not disclose. It is time Alamance was beginning to live within its income. If frills cannot be afforded without adding to the already heavy tax burden, then reduce the number. Somebody, somehow, pays every debt contracted.

A committee was appointed to prepare a uniform system for all the county offices to conform to the new law. It should be the essence of simplicity—not something that would require the services of an expert to explain.

A motion was made to dispose of 25 mules belonging to the county. It is understood the county owns a hundred or more. Modern machinery is cheaper than mule teams, faster and more efficient under average conditions, and costs only when in operation. However, a few mules are needed to blaze the way for the modern machine.

A proposition was made to interest the State Highway Commission in taking over the road from the underpass at Haw River to Whitsett. Does that mean that Graham, Elon College and Gibsonville are eventually to be left off of the State Highway map?

A motion was carried to let the assessments by the committee in Newlin township stand. If there are no errors or inequalities in them they should stand, otherwise they should be corrected as far as possible when pointed out.

Cover Crops Good for Orchard Soils

Winter cover crops serve the self-same purpose on orchard soils that they do in the general fields. That is, the crops add some nitrogen and plant food, add humus which increases the water-holding capacity of the soil, prevent washing and leaching and improve the physical condition of the soil.

"Orchard growers use cover crops mainly to increase the fertility of their soils and to increase the moisture supply," says C. D. Matthews, head of the department of horticulture at State College. "These are the two main factors influencing the vigor and yields of the trees. Production in bearing orchards is closely associated with the vigor of the trees, while the vigor of the trees, in turn, is largely dependent on nitrogen and moisture."

In the mountain and piedmont sections of the State, a combination of winter vetch and Abruzzi rye gives splendid results as a cover crop, states Prof. Matthews. This combination is generally seeded about the last of August at the rate of 15 to 20 pounds of vetch and a bushel of rye per acre. When used alone, vetch is seeded at the rate of 30 pounds per acre. Rye is also used extensively as a fall and winter cover crop. When planted alone it is seeded at the rate of 1 1/2 to 2 bushels of seed per acre. When used alone, crimson clover is seeded at the rate of 15 pounds per acre and, in combination with rye, is seeded at the rate of 10 pounds of clover seed to one bushel of the rye.

In eastern or central North Carolina, the clover or vetch combination with rye is seeded from the middle to the last of September.

In the coastal plain section of North Carolina, there is no better cover crop than bur clover. This crop is seeded in August at the rate of 5 bushels of seed in the bur or 20 pounds of clean seed per acre. Best results are secured when the bur clover seed is soaked for 15 to 20 minutes in warm water before planting.
