Mr. Jno. R. Harder, former resident of Graham and native of Alamance county, died in Greensboro last Friday night at 12:25 in his 61st year. He had been in poor health for several years. About two years ago he moved from here to Greensboro. In earlier life he was a prominent and well known business man of this county.

The funeral was held from Providence church Sunday afternoon at 3:00 o'clock, conducted by Dr. P. H. Fleming, assisted by Rev. C. E. Hoigin, deceased pastor in Greensboro, and Rev. W. E. Harrop, and the interment was in the church cemetery. Among the large attendance were a number of friends from Greensboro.

Deceased is survived by his widow, who was Miss Mamie McDaniel of Graham, three sons; W. P., O. P. and A. M. Harder, all of Greensboro; one brother, W. N. Harder, and a half-sister, Miss Corinna Smith, of Faucette township.
