A late statement is to the effect that there are 7,000,000 on the unemployment list in this country. The building program that Mr. Hoover formulated to help tide over should be given a boost for the employment of idle hands.

Republicans have been escaping the primary heretofore, but two or more Republicans have signified their intention to be candidates for the nomination for U. S. Senator, and hence they will have to share honors with the Democrats in a State wide primary.

The navy limitation conference in London has had anything but smooth sailing. At last Great Britain, Japan and the United States have reached an agreement, but France and Italy are still outside the pact. They may yet agree and come in, but France is not in a mood to be put on a parity with Italy.

In a probe of prohibition enforcement being held in Washington, Raskob, Democratic National Chairman, was a witness. Either the appearance or testimony of Raskob so incensed Senator Simmons that he flew off at a tangent and delivered himself of a bitter speech against anything favoring opposition to the prohibition amendment to the constitution. Senator Simmons, it seems, has had time to cool off somewhat since the affair of 1928.

**THE GRUNDY TARIFF**

The tariff bill which has taken up a half year or more in the making, has been defined thus by the Lexington (Ky.) Herald:

"The Grundybund is the name which is given to that group formed under the direction of Senator Grundy after he was appointed as Pennsylvania's representative in the upper House. Prior to the time that Grundy took personal charge on the floor at least a moderate tariff bill was being written. No one questions that the present tariff bill is the result of deals, logrolling and manipulations."

Continuing, the same paper says "the bill was written by the head Grundy, of the Pennsylvania manufacturers who raised vast sums for the Republican national campaign chest and went to Washington to collect the special favors which the contributors expected."

The kind of tariff bill that has been handed to the American people is thus described, not by Democratic publications, but Republican and independent newspapers:

Boston Evening Transcript, Republican: In no other way can senatorial tariff making of the last 10 months be given the smashing rebuke it deserves except by a veto of the bill if it is found to bear such earmarks as have been put upon it lately. . . . It seems impossible that from the hodge-podge the Senate will send to the House any measure can emerge that can command the confidence of the people.

Minneapolis Tribune, Republican: The bill came out of the House not as an agricultural bill but as a Grundy bill. It came out of the Senate Finance Committee as a modified Grundy bill. He (Grundy) believes the contributors to the war chest should be rewarded. To his way of thinking tariff favors are bought, sold and delivered over the counter.

Detroit News, Independent: A final series of vicious trades in the Senate accomplished a set of exacting and extortionate tariffs far

Chicago News, Independent: The nominal leaders of the Republican majority in the Senate. . . failed from the beginning to make their influence felt. . . Much of it (the Democratic-Progressive Republican coalition) work was undone when through the activity of a new com-

bination partially solicitous on behalf of the sugar, oil, lumber and leather industries, the Senate reversed its earlier action on certain important schedules.

**Judge Sink of Charlotte to Speak at Close of Graham Schools**

On May 30 Judge H. Hoyle Sink of Charlotte will deliver the literary address at the closing exercises of the Graham Schools. During the administration of Governor McLean Mr. Sink was appointed the first pardon commissioner of North Carolina and served ably for several years. He resigned this position to accept a place on the Superior Court bench and is now proving an able jurist. Judge Sink once served the United States government as a special representative to Japan and was later a commissioned officer during the World War. He is a brilliant speaker and the school authorities are fortunate in scheduling him for this address.
