The Tax Question

A meeting was held in the courtroom last Saturday morning in response to a request that each county hold a meeting and appoint delegates to go to Raleigh on the 21st, to consider ways for reducing land taxes. A fair representation was present, not as large, however, as was expected.

A good list, some twenty-five, were named to represent Alamance at the State meeting.

The protest is wide-spread against high taxes. It comes from all parts of the State. The effort will be made to find something else than land upon which to place the burden. Speeches of protest sound alright, but they will not get the thing desired. There must be legislation—something of a constructive character.

There are a few things that must be changed before there can be any appreciable reduction in taxes, that is, some of the holes into which the tax money is poured must be plugged up. That done, so much money will not be required.

It is true as to Alamance county, and no doubt the same condition prevails in most counties of the State that the overhead expenses of the county have grown beyond what is needful.

"Retrenchment and reform" used to be a campaign slogan years ago—so long ago that few of the present generation ever heard it. But it is needed now as much as it was ever needed.

The present county administration (the Republican) in the campaign two years ago, before the election, promised economy. If anything outstanding in that direction has been accomplished, it has not come to light.

Nor was it hardly expected that there would be much of a slashing in expenses. The Democratic administrations preceding had gone to considerable lengths in spending for several years, and when the Republicans came in, after being out for almost a generation, they had applications for the jobs a plenty, and the inclination was to take care of the partisans.

In short, there are too many salaried employees feeding at the public crib. Some of these must be guillotined before any substantial reduction in taxes can be accomplished.

For Congress

Up to a week ago it appeared there would be a full quartette of candidates for the Democratic nomination for Congress in the Fifth District to succeed Maj. Chas. M. Stedman. But the number has come down to two.

Hon. Sam M. Gattis of Hillsboro was one among the first to let it be known that he was a candidate for the nomination. And his offering was received with favor by many of his friends and acquaintances in the district. He is well known, better known than any of the others, in the greater part of the district, being rather centrally located and having ably served as Solicitor for several terms in a majority of the counties of the district. But he has given it out that he is no longer in he running. He has a large number of loyal friends in Alamance who would have been pleased to support him and will regret his decision. That he is able and well equipped would not be questioned.

John Folger of Mt. Airy, Surry county, threw his hat in the ring a month or so ago, but withdrew two weeks ago. The above out of the way leaves
